

NO NEW TAXES NEXT SESSION EXPERTS HOPE

Washington, Aug. 13 (AP)—Administration tax experts decided at a conference with President Roosevelt today that no new taxes will be necessary next session because of increasing revenues.

The gesture to answer business criticism of an unbalanced budget came after a meeting attended by Chairman Pat Harrison of the senate finance committee, Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., and Chairman Robert L. Doughton of the house ways and means committee.

"We have found business conditions improving so much and revenue receipts coming in so fast," said Harrison, "that we can reach the point of a balanced budget sooner than expected."

A letter to the president from Secretary Morgenthau was made public at the same time which said the treasury had concluded no new taxes or increases in present tax rates are necessary.

It was agreed that tax changes at the next session will be limited to the purpose, according to Morgenthau's letter, "of removing any inequities in present tax laws and modifying or ending taxes that create unfairness to consumers or to trade or have other disadvantages which outweigh the revenue yield."

"With continued recovery," Morgenthau's letter said, "we are steadily approaching a revenue yield which will be entirely adequate to cover the expenditures of government and to reduce the public debt."

However, none of the three tax experts would predict when a balanced budget would be reached.

JUNIOR CHAMPIONS GO TO BISMARCK

Roseburg, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—Junior league baseball teams from Portland and Seattle, champions of their respective states, faced their final test before the regional western playoffs at Bismarck, N. D., today.

Meeting for the northwest title were El Rey, which swept through Portland competition and the Oregon playoffs at Woodburn, and Gibson's Carrels, which won the Washington title in a playoff with Walla Walla.

The second game will be played tomorrow and the third, if one is necessary, Saturday. The tournament is being held in connection with the state convention of the American Legion, sponsor of the competition.

Eight champions from 16 western states will compete at Bismarck Aug. 29, 30, and Sept. 1, 2, and 3 for the right to enter the "World Series."

The witness was none other than Herbert C. Hoover, only living ex-president of the United States.

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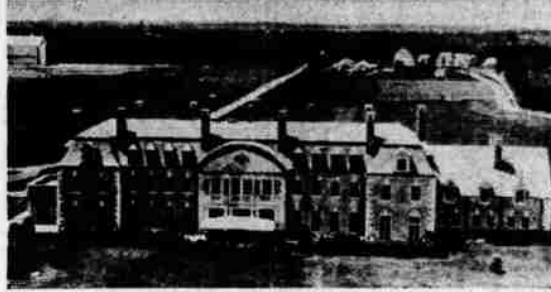

PARTY FORMATION HINGES ON NAMES

Secretary of State Earl Snell said today that any petition for the formation of a new political party in Oregon hearing the names of 14,870 qualified electors would be accepted by his office. This is in keeping with the policy of the department for many years, and in accordance with an opinion of the Attorney-General rendered in 1922, he said.

The announcement came as the result of a news story recently appearing in which Senator Peter Zimmerman of Yamhill county was quoted as stating that "I got a letter today from Earl Snell saying that we need 24,000 instead of 15,000 names."

"Mr. Zimmerman must have been misquoted as I wrote him to the effect that 14,870 names would be required, this being five percent of the number of votes cast for all candidates for representative in congress at the last general election," Snell said. At the same time Zimmerman's attention was called to the fact that some lawyers had questioned the correctness of the ruling and held that 24,225 names were required.

JOHNSON GETS DEFENSE FROM MIDI'S SISTERS

New York, Aug. 13 (AP)—Two beautiful Japanese girls yesterday defended the man suspected of slaying their actress sister, Miki Takakura, to death in Los Angeles and tried to explain how it was when east meets west.

Mary and Myrtle Takakura, actresses themselves, sat tearless and impassive in their cheap hotel room as they talked of their sister's death and of her lover, Ray Johnson, 39, who is being sought throughout the west coast.

"If he did it, I understand perfectly," said Myrtle, who is 18. "I blame her."

Mary, 20, and a former University of California co-ed, added:

"We wish to say that he was very faithful to Miki. He was never fickle."

The blaming of their sister came from police accounts of Miki's division of attentions between Johnson, whom she has known for two years, and William J. Brachard, of New York, whom she met on a bus trip westward 10 days ago.

The three sisters had tramped together and Myrtle and Mary knew of Johnson's love for Miki. It was an intense love, Mary said when she tried to explain what happens when east meets west.

"Something happened that is very intense," she said. "It is not like a love between two Japanese or two Americans. That was the way it was between my sister and this man Johnson. He loved her too much."

They did not think they could testify for Johnson if he is charged with murder but Mary said hopefully, "Maybe he will show that he was crazy." They planned to leave for California as soon as arrangements can be made with their manager.
