CHIEF LAUDED BY LEADER OF CIVIL SERVICE

That the civil service laws of the nation have been as faithfully observed by the Roosevelt administration as they were in the administrations of President Harding, Coolidge and Hoover is the conclusion of John H. Bartlett, republican, who was president of the United States civil service commission under President Harding and who served as first assistant postmaster general under Mr. Coolidge and Mr. Hoover.

"I am bound to conclude," he declared in a letter to the New York Times, "that those who have administered the civil service laws under President Roosevelt, have been as considerate of, and as obedient to the purposes of the law as those who administered the civil service laws under the administrations of President Roosevelt's predecessors."

"In one particular, the record of the democratic party with reference to civil service in the post office department is superior to that of the republicans, and on this ground I cite chiefly the fact that President Wilson put all postmasters of all classes under civil service. Then President Harding, by executive order, removed presidential postmasters from civil service and put them again in politics, where they remained during the succeeding republican administrations for 12 years and from which political status President Roosevelt himself, has now rescued them."

"It must be noted, as bearing upon the motive of President Roosevelt himself, that he selected a progressive republican, Secretary Ickes, to build up perhaps the largest personnel with which to combat the depression. Then he selected another progressive republican, Secretary Wallace, to build up the great units of personnel to manage the battles against the enemies of agriculture. Then he selected Mr. Hopkins to head the relief movement. I never heard or read to what political party Mr. Hopkins belongs, if any. He certainly was not a politician."

"It was essential for President Roosevelt to build up an army to fight the depression, consisting of men and women who were loyal to his purposes, and, seeing how bitter against his purposes the republicans are, it was natural he should find, perhaps, a majority of those persons were democrats. But I know a very large number of republicans here in Washington in important positions under the new deal. I also know of a few of these republicans here in Washington, under civil service, who are now quite boldly talking against President Roosevelt and his new deal—I do not desire to be unfair to republicans, but I do insist that republicans shall not be unfair to President Roosevelt."
