The annual reunion of former students of the Santiam Academy at Lebanon will take place on the campus, Sunday, August 23.

Old-Time Students Of Santiam Academy To Meet Next Sunday

Santiam academy at Lebanon is the second oldest pioneer school on the Pacific coast. Former students and friends of the institution plan their second annual reunion next Sunday on the campus to renew friendships and revere the memory of those passed on. One of the features of the program is the ringing of the original bell.

Alfred Melvin Williams of Dallas will deliver the address of the day beginning at 11:30 o'clock and J. M. Burtenschaw and Helen Power Messinger will receive the guests. Albert Wilson will arrange the tables for the basket dinner to be served at 1 o'clock under the large trees that were planted from time to time on festival days by the students.

On the third Sunday of August, last year, a ceremonial unveiling of a monument on the grounds in honor of Jeremiah Ralston, and Morgan and Owen Kees was attended by former students of the entire northwest. These men were donors of land on which the building was placed.

The origin of the academy was in the year 1852 housed in a log cabin school. Today the landscaped extensive campus is the playground for the Lebanon high school with the academy building among the trees in the background.

The first teacher was L. T. Woodward. Other teachers well known in the early history of the state are Mrs. L. T. Woodward, John Dillon, Isaac Dillon, Dr. C. H. Hall, Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Blaine, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Odell, J. B. Calloway, W. B. Nichols, J. L. Gilbert, Professor Lewis, Dr. David Torbett and S. A. Randle, father of George H. Randle, secretary of the student reunion organization.

The academy was maintained by the generosity of the citizens as an early record discloses donors of money and labor to include Jeremiah Ralston, W. M. Smith, Jason Wheeler, James Ridgeway, Dr. D. W. Ballard, Richmond Chadde, Richard Chadde, Mose Bland, Jesse George, Isaac Coryell, J. H. Johnson, A. B. Griggs, H. Peterson, A. S. Peterson, William Gallagher, Robert Miller, William Heim, J. A. Dought, George Barnett, S. Hyde, Arthur Saltmarsh, William R. Bishop, Reuben Coyle, James Combs, John W. Bell, S. A. Nickerson, J. N. McDonald, W. S. Ekins, Luther Ekins, A. J. Richardson, John McKinley, Mose Parker, William Gore, Elmer Kees, Owen Kees, Isaac Kees, Andrew Kees, John Settle, Joseph Meist, A. S. Knox and William Marks.

At the close of the Civil war the enrollment was 105 students. At the beginning of the war, 13 years earlier, 52 boys and 34 girls were enrolled. The class schedule shows a full course of study, none optional, however, that met the demands of the times.

Among the events that made history during the life time of the academy is the assassination of Lincoln recalled by a student of the institution at that time now living in Portland, Mrs. Pauline Quid, who attended the affair of last year; the statehood of Oregon; the Santiam tribes of Indians and the peaceful Calapoosias that never raised a tomahawk to hinder the progress of the whites, were moving back from the lands they had possessed for centuries; the state capitol building, located for a time at Corvallis in 1855 and was moved to Salem later; the circuit riders and founders of early churches were on the job; Joe Meek once delivered a lecture in the academy auditorium; and the sick for miles around were

STAYTON TO IMPROVE BY ROAD OILING

Stayton—Residents of the Stayton and Sublimity districts are planning for the greatest road oiling program in the past several years.

Sublimity residents, led by Councilman L. Haasler, have received the approval of the Marion county court for the oiling of 1000 feet of street in the town, which will give the community the greatest percentage of paved streets of any district in the county. The section to be oiled on which work started today, is a stretch between the paved county road and a block east of the Coon Hollow road. This leaves but two blocks of street in the town unpaved.

Residents of Stayton, irked by the dust created by passing trucks, have launched a move for the oiling of streets here under the Hancock act. It is necessary to obtain the signatures of owners of the majority of property affected before the project may be undertaken under the act.

Mayor George A. Smith last night called a special meeting of the city council to discuss the possibility of oiling the streets of the city and the aldermen decided this was the only feasible method of disposing of the problem. The move was started with the appearance of H. W. George, superintendent of schools, asking the oiling of the street in front of the school building.

Petitions already are in circulation calling upon the council to oil the streets of Stayton and defray the cost through Hancock bonds, payable on a ten-year basis.

It is expected that a definite plan will be evolved at the next meeting of the council.
