

WOOD SURVEY SPONSORED BY TIMBER FIRM

Silverton—The Silver Falls Timber company, Silverton's major industry, under direction of H. W. Preston, sales manager, is sponsoring the Oregon woods survey which is another move in the campaign of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen, the West Coast Lumbermen and interested Oregonians, in the proposition to include in Oregon's new constitution, special and unusual native Oregon woods accentuating the possibilities and beauties thereof.

Other data than finished samples of Oregon Woods is immediately necessary as to quantity, location and character of such materials which this survey includes and is being undertaken by various organizations by means of a comprehensive questionnaire. An additional purpose of the survey is to bring to light exceptional material of choice woods, privately owned.

An educational phase of the move is to acquaint interested craftsmen and the general public with facts and to arrange display of finished material showing the possibilities of Oregon woods and their uses.

The four groups—commercial woods, major hardwoods, minor hardwoods and rare woods—each have special features of utility, such as paneling, furniture, inlays, carving, etc.

The data developed by the survey will show the possibilities of "statistical" as a symphony of architectural harmony in native Oregon woods, rather than a pointless, heterogeneous collection, which latter would be less satisfactory than no use at all.

Cooperation is offered in demonstration of adequate handling and seasoning by the Moore Dry Kiln people and the forestry department of the Oregon State college, and in finishing by the Oregon Craftsman and others, thereby making applicable to these Oregon woods the most recent scientific research and practices.

Survey data received will be immediately classified and tabulated to be available at the earliest possible moment for the architects thus furthering appreciation and utility of Oregon forest products.

NEW PLANER MILL BEGINS OPERATION

Mill City—The new planer mill of the Mill City Planning & Processing company began actual operations Tuesday morning, August 18. The plant, which is now open for all lumber refining business, was created by the owners. They include Carl Kelly, president and manager, A. R. Hoelzel, secretary and treasurer, Frank Taylor, Clyde Rogers, and T. W. Allen. The hum of the planer adds to the industrial sound of saw and whistle emanating from the new sawmill in creating an atmosphere of "old-time prosperity" for Mill City.

Clackamas County Projects Go Ahead

Aurora—According to announcement, two projects which would provide work for 477 Clackamas county men, have been approved by the Clackamas county court and the local WPA engineers and have been sent to Washington for final approval. One of these projects is the continuation of the Johnson creek flood control, costing \$183,073 and employing 345 men, and the other is the Oswego-Tualatin road project, costing \$63,540 and employing 112 men.

FRED DE VRIES ON WAY HOME FROM NORWAY

Middle Grove — Friends of Fred De Vries, of Trarion, president of the Marion county Sunday School council are interested to hear of his return to the United States after attending the World Sunday School convention held this summer at Oslo, Norway and to which De Vries was a delegate.

De Vries wrote from Zurich, Switzerland, and said the convention had been a wonderful inspiration. Forty nine nations had delegates there, 820 of whom were from the United States. He advises all the Sunday school workers throughout the county to have photographs taken of classes and buildings for display work at the Sunday school booth at the Oregon state fair. He will have some pictures of the convention at Oslo, but is anxious to have a large display from the Marion county Sunday schools. Photographs concerning Sunday school picnics or social gatherings, as well as class groups will be welcome from any part of Oregon. At the convention Egypt and other parts of Africa, Austria and the Scandinavian countries made much use of photographs.

According to plans De Vries would have sailed from Cherbourg on the Queen Mary about the middle of August and will return home about the last of the month.

"The whole trip had been one of enjoyment thus far," he writes "and I have seen the sun overhead at noon north of us at Panama on the trip through the canal and in Norway I have seen the sun in all its glory at midnight, and have taken a number of pictures of it. Switzerland was the tenth foreign nation visited and will leave here for France."

DEPOSITORS WILL RECEIVE DIVIDEND

Albany—Depositors in the commercial department of the Albany State bank, which is now in the process of liquidation, will receive approximately \$27,000 in the form of a dividend of 10 per cent on the total of commercial deposits, C. F. Anderson, representative of Mark Skinner, state superintendent of banks in charge of liquidation, announced today.

The dividend will bring to 61 per cent the total of deposits in the commercial department of that bank to be paid since it was closed in March, 1933. It will swell to 50 per cent the payments made since the institution was taken over by the banking department of the state.

Payments totaling 75.5 per cent on savings deposits have also been made.

SCHOOLS OF LINN OWING \$331,111.32

Albany—Obligations of Linn county school districts total the amount of \$331,111.32, according to figures compiled by County School Superintendent J. M. Bennett, which includes outstanding bonds and warrants, offset by cash on hand in the several districts.

The gross debt of all school districts is now \$410,055.50, but cash balances on hand total \$78,944, the superintendent's report shows.

Their six districts are listed as debtors, including Albany, Shedd, Sweet Home, Lebanon, Harrisburg and Halsey, maintaining high schools.

Of the county's 131 districts, 95 are without either warrant or bonded debt.
