

C. E. UNITS OF STATE GATHER ON AUGUST 24

Turner—The 17th annual summer conference for religious leadership training of the Christian Endeavor society of Oregon, will convene August 24 at the Turner tabernacle and continue through August 30.

Preparatory to the opening of the conference the executive committee of the state Christian Endeavor union will meet at Turner for two days, August 22 and 23. Arthur J. Stanley, the president, will preside at the executive meeting. Included on the committee are all state officers, union presidents, ex-state presidents and denominational representatives. The regional vice-presidents and union presidents will have special meetings together.

The program schedule for the summer conference will include a Bible study period for 45 minutes each morning. These will be under the leadership of Rev. James A.
