

BECK RESIGNS AS AGENT FOR POLK DISTRICT

Dallas—J. R. Beck, who has served as county agent for Polk county since October, 1926, has resigned to accept another position with the extension service of Oregon State college. The resignation becomes effective September 1. The Beck family will live in Corvallis where they have purchased a residence. W. C. Leth of Newberg will take over the office vacated by Beck. He has been associated with the work of the county agent since July 1. Leth is a graduate of the University of Idaho and has been the Smith-Hughes agent at Newberg for the past 11 years. Both he and Mrs. Leth have been active in fraternal and social circles in Newberg. At the present time he is serving as worshipful master of the Newberg Masonic lodge.

WILL ADD TWO TO POSTOFFICE

Corvallis—Two new men will be added to the Corvallis postoffice force beginning with September. The two men will work in the main office, one as a regular clerk and the other as an auxiliary clerk to help out wherever needed. Postmaster Victor P. Moses has been informed of the granting of his request for the additional force by the postoffice department after a lengthy examination of local mail conditions by C. B. Welter, Portland postoffice inspector, who spent more than a week here in July looking over the situation. Appointments for the new jobs have already been made by the postmaster here and the men will take over their new work as soon as confirmation is received from Washington, D. C. This is expected about the first of next month. Approximately 50 applicants for postoffice jobs have sent their names to Washington as desirous of taking examinations for the civil service jobs. The date of this examination has not yet been announced, but after it is taken those passing will be placed on the list of eligibles for work in the office here.

BUILDING OF SCHOOL BEGINS

Monmouth—Construction of the new school building in the Antelope district, five miles northwest of Monmouth, got under way Thursday morning. The contract has been let to Cecil A. GETS DRUNK AND TROUBLE RISES
