

POLK AWAITING MAJOR AFFAIRS LATE NEXT WEEK

Dallas—Two events, outstanding in the community for the past few years, are scheduled to take place here next week. The county fair will hold away at the armory for two days, September 2 and 3, and Farmers' day will be held on the second day of the fair.

As has been the custom in the past 4-H club work will be a big feature of the fair. Judah Willis, county school superintendent and also superintendent of 4-H club projects, reports that club work this year has aroused a greater degree of interest than usual and the exhibits which will be swine, sheep, dairy cattle, goats, poultry, corn, potatoes, vegetables, cooking, clothing and canning are expected to be of high standard. There will be judging teams in cooking, clothing and canning crops and poultry and demonstration teams in the same classes. A style dress revue for girls is expected to be one of the high spots of the 4-H club groups.

Prizes appear on the premium list this year for Boy Scout projects, Camp Fire girls' projects and the Future Farmers of America will be on hand with an exhibition of the work they are doing. The various department superintendents all report excellent prospects for a fine showing in all lines.

L. H. McBee will have charge of the grains, grasses and vegetables; J. E. Goetz is looking for a bigger and better fruit exhibit; Mrs. Fred Holman, in charge of the cut flower division, has had many inquiries about her department and believes that this indicates a good showing ahead. While Mrs. Carl McBee, in charge of domestic science, Mrs. Conrad Starnin, fine arts superintendent, and Mrs. Milo Bergey, domestic art superintendent, are looking for the best showing in years.

The judging and awards will be started on the first day. The fair board has made special efforts to provide some real entertainment on both Wednesday and Thursday evenings. A band concert will be given Wednesday night by the Salk Creek band and another concert will be given Thursday by the Independence band. Gentleman Farmer Plan Being Developed Close To Scio by Dr. Hosch

Scio—Stretching nearly a mile in its north and south length, Dr. J. F. Hosch's 162 acre tract just north of the Scio city limits, offers an ideal spot for farm and home. Dr. Hosch now lives in Bend. The land has been in the family of Mrs. Hosch for three generations, and is a part of the 640 acres homesteaded in 1846 by her grandfather, Preston Munkers. Nearly half of this do-

nation land claim has been sold, the remaining 381 acres until recently being in possession of Mrs. Hosch's father, T. J. Munkers, of Portland. A few months ago, this remaining tract was divided among his three daughters. Mrs. Hosch receiving the 147 acres near the east boundary. Dr. Hosch purchased an additional 15 acres from Mrs. Peter Blinford (Sylvia Munkers) of Portland.

This latter tract has an excellent all year spring, pipes from which will furnish water to the caretaker's cottage now under construction. Ultimately, a reservoir will furnish enough water for a larger residence planned by Dr. Hosch.

An enthusiastic horticulturist, Dr. Hosch has planted some 900 trees of filbert, walnut and various fruit. Rare plants and shrubs will add to the beauty of the homestead, as they do in Dr. Hosch's famed gardens reclaimed from the bed of the Rogue river near Bend.

Dr. Hosch selected heavy cedar posts from the Willamette national forest 60 miles east of Scio to replace wire and rail fences of former generations. A heavy wire fence has been placed entirely around the Hosch farm. Anchor posts of stone masonry mark the corners of the land, and a large stone gateway invites the passerby at the east entrance.

Approximately 75 acres of the land is being summer fallowed to exterminate Canadian thistles. Another portion has produced a fine crop of oats. An abundant vegetable garden was also under cultivation this year.

Devoted to his avocation, Dr. Hosch plans to irrigate the already fertile land for greater crop production. An irrigation ditch or flume will furnish a plentiful supply of water from nearby Thomas creek. Land already fallowed and additional tracts yet to be cleared will produce for a small dairy herd.

According to friends here, Dr. Hosch plans to retire as gentleman farmer, making Scio his final, as it was his early, home.

District Attorney James K. Weatherford, Jr., designated Thursday, September 3, as the date for convention of the Linn county circuit court grand jury.
