

NORTH SANTIAM WILL DEDICATE SCHOOL HOUSE

Stanton—Plans were completed this week for the dedication program for the new North Santiam schoolhouse, which is just being completed at a cost of approximately \$20,000. The dedication program is scheduled for Saturday, September 5.

Scores of old time residents who attended the North Santiam school in the early days and teachers who were members of the staff years ago, have been invited to attend the celebration and take part in the program. Representative James W. Mott, congressman from this district, is to be the principal speaker of the day.

Out of a brush heap, which completely obstructed the view of the old schoolhouse, the new building was constructed, giving that district one of the best country schools in this section of the state. The work has been completed with the exception of the hanging of the electric fixtures.

For years, students of this district were forced to contend with unsanitary conditions which menaced their health. Because of this, members of the school board launched plans last fall for the participation by the government in a program to give the district a new school. Through the cooperation of Senator Charles L. McNary, this allotment was obtained and work started at the close of the school session this spring.

The new building is of frame construction, accommodating two rooms, a stage, kitchen and library. Modern facilities have been incorporated in the new building. The stage is large enough to permit the production of plays and the kitchen will serve the home economics classes and permit the serving of hot dishes to the students at noon.

Approximately 50 pupils attend the North Santiam school and the enrollment is increasing each season, members of the board reported. Miss Peller, formerly teacher at the Coon Hollow school, was added to the staff this year. Mrs. Ford of Oresham is the second teacher.

Members of the school board are George K. Miller, president, Arden Nammer and J. D. Lot.

VOLUME OF SMOKE ALARMS RESIDENTS

Dallas—A spark from an electric pump combined with a gas leak is believed to have been responsible for an alarm which sent the fire department hurrying to a store in North Dallas shortly before 1 o'clock Friday afternoon. ALBANY YOUTH CRASHES RAIL AVOIDING CAR

Albany—Jackie, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Thompson, Sunrise, suffered severe concussion of the brain and a deep scalp wound when he seized the railing on the lower end of the Third street bridge in Bryant park and was catapulted from his wheel when he attempted to get out of the way of a truck driven by Jack Fox. Fox took the boy to the Albany General hospital.

Fox said the boy apparently became confused and grasped the railing to avoid possible collision with the truck. Thirteen-year-old Mary Johnson was less seriously injured when her bicycle was struck at First and Jackson streets by a car driven by Frank A. Fixen. Miss Johnson was also taken to the Albany General hospital where it was found she had received head cuts, which were not thought to be serious. Miss Johnson was thrown to the pavement. Fixen claimed the girl was riding on the wrong side of the street and turned to her own side just as he swung to the left to let her by. A collision resulted, he said.

DRAINAGE DISTRICT PETITIONERS DENIED

Aurora—At a meeting of the Clackamas county court Wednesday, the petition for the formation of the proposed Boring drainage district was denied, this action being taken after another petition requesting that the original one be denied had been filed.

The court order pointed out that it appeared that all the lands in the proposed district would not be affected beneficially by the proposed district and that the benefits of reclamation will not apparently exceed the damage done to the property. Only one speaker, Wallace Telford, Boring merchant, spoke in favor of the proposed district, while a large number expressed opposition to the project, claiming that its benefits and costs had been misrepresented and that the lands which would have to share the costs of the project would not be benefited.

NEW DEALERS IN ALL WALKS TOOZE TOPIC

Albany—The new dealers, from the President down, have shown an utter disregard and disrespect for our constitutional form of government," said Walter L. Toozé, assistant republican state chairman, in an address Thursday night before a large concourse of Linn county republicans held in the Albany armory.

Toozé continued to assail the "new deal" when he said that the new dealers had the "Farmers of America goose-stepping to unconstitutional laws and to autocratic regulations, promulgated by a bureau in Washington, headed by the autocratic, idealist, but wholly impractical Mr. Wallace. They also attempted to completely control and regiment industry, and even went so far as to seek control of the press through the process of the NRA code. They are now attempting to regiment those on relief and on the work relief projects as new deal voters, that they may continue in power. Never before in the nation's history has been witnessed such an open and deliberate attempt to corrupt the electorate as now prevails," Toozé also said.

Boondoggling was bad enough he said, but this further waste of the people's money in various channels of work projects is likely to be the proverbial straw that broke the camel's back, Toozé said.

Speaking also briefly beside L. E. Bladine of McMinnville, state secretary, and Arthur Prialux, republican state chairman, were candidates for office in Linn county on the republican ticket.

LIFE IS JIGSAW PROFESSOR SAYS

Corvallis—O. R. Chambers, professor of psychology at Oregon State college, warned citizens of the United States to be eternally vigilant and to beware of dictatorship in the nation in his address to the Rotary club at its regular luncheon meeting. "Life is like a jigsaw puzzle," the speaker said, "with each nation or dictator believing it has all the pieces necessary for the greatest set of people in the world."

"And now France and Russia, and Germany and Italy are trying to force their particular brand of Utopia down the throats of the Spaniards," he commented.

This nation has struggled for so many years to perfect a civilization that guarantees each man or woman the right of personal thinking and freedom of speech, that it behooves every thinking person to be eternally vigilant so that dictatorship will not take root here, he said. It seems such an easy way out for the time being, he added.

CLAKAMAS SENDING PICKERS TO MARION

Aurora—According to L. C. Stoll, manager of the Clackamas county employment office, more than 200 persons have been placed on private employment jobs during the past two weeks, many being assigned to other counties.

Thirty-four have been assigned to the Gerber brothers highway job at Spray, Wheeler county, including 12 truck drivers, eight spotters, two blade men and two firemen.

For the week ending August 22 the employment office sent out 54 men to jobs outside the county, 40 going to the Grand Coulee and Bonneville dam projects and the other 14 to highway jobs while 18 others were placed on private jobs, including carpenters and farm hands and three women domestics. More than 100 hop pickers have been assigned from the local office, most of them going to Marion county.
