## REDUCED POWER RATES LOOMING THRU DISTRICT

Stayton—Residents of Stayton and the Santiam valley may have in the near future, the lowest electric power rate in the country, E. D. B. Dodson, secretary of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and Washington representative of that organization, told the Stayton Mail this week.

The opinion was based on the possible action of congress in approving the report of the army engineers now engaged in making a survey for flood control of the Willamette valley. The report probably will be made public in December, Dodson reported.

According to preliminary surveys made by the federal engineers, the cost of the entire flood control project, which includes all of the six coast rivers and streams, would approximate \$250,000,000. It is probable that the report will advise the undertaking of the project in unit form, he declared.

"The survey, which was agreed upon only after a hard fight in congress by the Oregon delegation including Senators Charles McNary and Frederick Steiwer and Representative James Mott, is one of the most extensive in this section of the country and rapidly is proving that the Santiam valley potentially has the lowest power rate available. This rate will be made possible by the fact that the survey, primarily for flood control, would, if enacted, have the waters of the Santiam under control, and very little added expense would be necessary to capitalize on the power."

According to the present scale, the approximate cost of generating power at Bonneville is two mills per kilowatt hour but an additional cost of approximately one mill per kilowatt hour is contracted by the transmission of the power from Bonneville to Stayton. Advance reports indicate that the Santiam power cost would approximate two mills per kilowatt hour which is comparable to that of Bonneville at the Bonneville dam.

The advance report of the survey findings comes at a time when Marion county is about to decide upon the question of a People's Utility district, under the so-called grange power bill to be voted on in November. If the report of the army engineers, approving the Santiam project is endorsed by congress, all existing laws may have to be revised to permit residents of this district to take advantage of this low cost power. It was pointed out.

## HARRIS GIVES CHAPEL TALK; OFFICERS MEET

Albany—Dr. Ernest Lloyd Harris, former member of the United States consular service, will speak at a public meeting in Albany college chapel Thursday morning. This was announced by R. W. Tripp, chairman of the Lin county republican central committee. Dr. Harris is scheduled to speak Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock in the Benton county court house at Corvallis.

At Corvallis Dr. Harris will give a political talk, but at Albany he will confine his discussion to an exposition of communism and its effect upon nations. Due to his alarm at the spread of communism, Dr. Harris, according to his statement, was devoting his life to the mission of combatting red propaganda. Dr. Harris was commissioned by the British government to take the bodies of the late Russian czar and family out of Russia and his articles regarding this venture were published in the Saturday Evening Post in 1922 and 1923.

## Coast Fire Fighters Are Breathing Easier After Battle Session

DePoe Bay—At last the population of this picturesque resort and fishing village breathes easily after a solid week of fighting the fire-demon which swooped down upon them during the driving east wind of a week ago Sunday.

This Sunday it rained. For a day and a night it rained. DePoe Bay breathed—and for the first time it slept.

"Save as by Fire," was the minister's text down at the community hall Sunday morning, but for the most part the nerve-jaded population was not there. One little girl said, "My mother moved in and out six times." Some of the times in the day, some in the night. And everybody did it. The fire marshal with Uncle Sam's authority back of him had said to everybody, "If you have any valuables, move them out," and all but a few families moved not only their valuables but everything into the street and kept watch.

And not a house in DePoe Bay burned! Soldiers fought, boys from the civilian camps fought, motorists who had come to see remained to fight, and women fought for their homes and their effects. They won, though in the south borders of the village not a house stands without blackened stumps and logs almost touching them. DePoe Bay is a miracle of the season's fight with fire.

Saturday, Sunday and Monday, dozens of property owners and sightseers came to witness the aftermath of the fire and get the story. It still burns across the bay east of the town, though the rain has put an end to fear. It will burn perhaps for weeks in stumps and buried logs.

The terrific heat practically paralyzed their eyelids.

## VALLEY SCHOOL USED IN FIRST NATIONAL TEST

Mill City—Prof. E. B. Stevens of the University of Washington administered the first test in the program of the cooperative study of secondary school standards to the Mill City high school upper-classmen, Monday.

These tests are sent out from the executive office of the National committee in Washington, D. C., of which Dr. Walter C. Ellis is in charge. This study aims to determine the strength, weakness and needs of the high schools of the country and through the cooperation of the chosen schools to establish a stronger curriculum. Two hundred schools in the U. S. have been chosen for this testing program. In Oregon there are four on the list: Lincoln high school in Portland, McLoughlin high school in Milton-Freewater, Sheridan high school and Mill City high school. Stevens' visit will be followed from time to time by visits from other educators, as well as from committee members.

This is the second time Mill City high school has been used in a national program, the first in 1932 when the Teachers' college of Columbia university, N. Y., conducted an investigation of the comparative ratings of small and large high schools. In this, to quote the college, "the results have been highly gratifying to the friends of the small high school. Of the classes tested, over 80 per cent had positive deviations from the norm."

## BOND REFUNDS OCCUPY DALLAS CITY FATHERS

Dallas—The city council met in regular session Monday night for what will, in all probability, be the last meeting in the old city hall.

Among the business transacted was the passage of ordinance No. 467, an ordinance providing for the refunding of \$70,000 in water works bonds and calling for bids on same. Bid proposals will be received at the city up till the time the council meets in special session on October 23 to consider and pass upon all bids received. The step was taken in view of the exceedingly favorable bond market prevailing at the present time, and the desire to take advantage of any condition which might benefit the city. Payments on the existing issue are several thousand dollars ahead at the present time.

The water commission's report for the quarter which ended September 30 was presented. Receipts were \$7,808.88 and four \$1,000 bonds were retired during that period.

The council approved the application of W. D. Collins for a class "B" beverage license covering the sale of wines.

They also approved the application of Joe Violante for a beer license. Violante recently purchased Tony's Place on Court street.

N. L. Guy, a member of the water commission whose term had expired, was reappointed to succeed himself.

Following a decision made Monday night, future consideration of any applications for a liquor license will cost the applicant the sum of five dollars.

Mayor Lief S. Finseth presided over the meeting.
