

COUNCIL MOVES TO STOP DOGS; BAN 'CRACKERS'

Woodburn—The ordinance to prohibit dogs running at large was passed by the city council at the regular meeting Tuesday night and also an ordinance to prohibit the sale and use of firecrackers in the city.

The dog ordinance prohibits dogs from running loose or being at large on any street or public place in the city of Woodburn, authorizes the impounding, selling or killing of dogs found running loose. It provides that the owner of such dog be notified before killing or disposing of sale and if the dog is not claimed and redemption fee paid within five days the dog shall be humanely killed. The owner may demand a hearing or trial if there is a question of the right of the city to impound. The fee to be paid for the first offense is to be \$2 and for the second or subsequent offense the fee shall be \$4. The street commissioner or any police officer shall enforce the ordinance. The fine for violation of the ordinance is to be not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 and as the ordinance carries an emergency clause it goes into effect at once.

The firecracker ordinance prohibits the sale or use of firecrackers in the city limits at any time but a special permit may be granted by the council for a display of fireworks. The penalty for violation of this ordinance is not less than \$1 nor more than \$50.

The offer of \$200 by E. E. Settlemier in settlement of an assessment on his property was accepted and the lien canceled.

A warrant was authorized drawn for the purchase of lots 3 and 6 in block 8 of Chapelle's addition from Marion county for \$80.57, the city to quiet title to the property.

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STAYTON REALTY VALUES DECLINE REPORT REVEALS

Stayton—Valuation of Stayton real property will show a decline of approximately two per cent for next year, resulting in increased individual assessments, according to preliminary estimates reported here today. This decrease in assessed valuation for Stayton is expected to be five per cent less than the average drop for assessments for Marion county, officials declared.

The assessed valuation of Marion county property last year was approximately \$42,000,000 which is about \$3,000,000 more than the valuation placed on the property this fall. For 1936 taxes payable next year, a large part of this decrease was caused by the city's purchase of the Oregon-Washington water company in Salem.

According to the report today by R. "Bud" Shelton, county assessor, many of the decreases and adjustments made by the office this year, should have been made several years ago. All deputy collectors were instructed this year to adjust assessed valuation of properties in accordance with the value of surrounding property. Assessor Shelton said that the Stayton valuation would have shown a marked decrease except for the building revival which has been experienced here in the past several months. E. C. Denny, deputy collector reported.

"In many cases no decreases have been shown on the rolls for properties which have been allowed to decline in value for years," Denny said. "Many of the old houses, now renting for but a few dollars a month, are being assessed at the same valuation as they were years ago."

"The new construction work which has been undertaken here during the past several months offset these decreases, excepting about two per cent."

The reduced valuation will mean an increased individual assessment even though the city and county budgets are comparable with those of last year. The assessments are based on the amount of money to be raised by taxation.

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Cain Raisers Wanted By Sorghum Producer In Silverton Section

Silverton—"Our chief trouble is to get people to raise cane in this neighborhood," stated Walter Klopfenstein as he sat at one end of the evaporation tank and occasionally turned a little iron wheel which in some way kept the sorghum from boiling over further down the line of various stages of thin and thick syrup that traveled down and back the length of the tank and came out finished sorghum.

This pure natural sorghum might boil over but it cannot scorch for it is cooked in the only steam sorghum mill in the northwest and small copper pipes, three of them, run the two lengths of the evaporation tank furnishing sufficient heat to boil the juice to the consistency for table and cooking use.

The cane which is being harvested at this time is of excellent quality this season as the weather has been ideal for the maturing of the cane. The sugar content runs from 12 to 19 percent with an average of around 15 percent. Cane from a little over an acre of ground, tested 17 per cent sugar, netting the grower 60 gallons of sorghum and 30 bushels of seed. The fodder, after the juice is squeezed out, is as good as any other sorghum for iron rollers, is too tough to be used for feed, but left to rot for two years makes excellent fertilizer.

The juice is boiled down one-third in huge vats in the basement room, pumped to the receiving vats on the basement floor of the mill from which the liquid is run into the copper evaporation tank and from there, down a cooler pipe to the first floor where it is caught in a tub. Waxed paper or glass containers are filled through a faucet in the tub and the sorghum is ready for market. Eight gallons of juice makes one gallon of sorghum.

Four people are required to manage the mill during cooking days. Miss Rachel Klopfenstein is as proficient as any brother in feeding the cane to the rollers, turning the machinery on and off and tempering the heat to the boiling-over stage as well as skimming the scum which is very bitter in the first boilings and a delicious food at the final touch just before the syrup starts down the cooling rod.

The best cane ever brought to the Klopfenstein mill was received Tuesday when H. J. Reilly of the Molalla district appeared with his contribution. The stalks grew from 6 to 8 feet tall and averaged 1 1/2 inches in diameter. The seed of this variety is being widely sought as the sorghum same in Oregon is still an experiment and just such a surprise as the Reilly cane is what the Klopfensteins are looking for.

The mill is near the Brush Creek school on a side road between the two Salem—Silverton highways, about two miles from Silverton. Visitors are welcome.

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COUNCIL SITS IN MUNICIPAL HALL 1ST TIME

West Salem—Quarters in the new municipal building were occupied by the city council for the first time this week. The election board was selected and will be composed of Bert Flack, chairman; Rev. K.
