AUTO COSTS EQUAL NATION'S FOOD BILL

New York, Oct. 13 (AP)—Expenditures by the American public for automobiles, gasoline and associated items in the first 8 months this year aggregated \$5,600,000,000 or practically the same as the nation's food bill, A. W. Zelonek, economist of the International Statistical bureau disclosed today.

Automobile expenditures were 30 percent above the 1934 period, while food showed an increase of only 5 percent.

The greatest gain in expenditures in the first 8 months, Zelonek pointed out, was registered by stores dealing in lumber, building material and hardware, about 23 percent greater than in 1935.

Expenditures in all divisions generally were at new highs for the recovery.

One Killed, Two Hurt In Auto Collision

Klamath Falls, Ore., Oct. 13 (AP)—One man was killed and two others seriously injured in an automobile collision 15 miles south of here on the Dallas-California highway last night.

Clyde Brown, 38, Klamath Falls, driver of one of the cars, was killed. Hugh Howard, owner of the car, suffered a crushed chest.

Cliff Webster, 59, Bend, driver of the other car, suffered the loss of the sight of one eye and was very badly cut. State police said Webster said he had no lights on his car which came from a side-road onto the main highway.

LEWIS SILENT ON PEACE MOVE

Washington, Oct. 13 (AP)—John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, declined today to comment on the American Federation of Labor executive council's move to bring his ten rebel unions back into the federation.

Lewis would give reporters no indication of when he would act on the federation's proposal for a peace conference. This proposal came from the haters, cap and millinery workers union, originally and was ratified by the council late yesterday.

Lewis last week said he would not talk peace until the ten unions, suspended for "insurrection," were restored to good standing.

The Lewis group wants to organize all workers in each mass production industry into one union. The federation, controlled by leaders who favor the organization of many workers according to crafts instead of by industries suspended the ten unions September 5 for refusing to abandon their "industrial union" drive.

FLYING BOX CARS TO CARRY FREIGHT

Los Angeles, Oct. 13 (AP)—Use of the skyways for freight service with giant "flying box cars" carrying merchandise from city to city was announced here today by Transcontinental and Western Air Lines.

The first run of the flying freight service starts next Monday between New York and Chicago but the company hopes soon to extend the run from coast to coast, traffic manager George Cusack said.

He said the basic rates for shipping 100 pounds from Los Angeles to New York would be \$42, a cut of 37 percent from the present rate for express carried on passenger planes.

The new "freight cars" will be all-metal, multi-motored transport ships which will carry no passengers and will fly almost as fast as the transcontinental planes.

MT. ANGEL FLAX PLANT GRANTED MORE MONEY

Additional federal funds sufficient to complete the Mt. Angel cooperative flax plant and finance its operation for one year brought the total invested there to \$24,332. G. R. Boatwright, district WPA supervisor, announced. Construction work was renewed.

Boatwright announced another \$22,658 was received for the new Springfield plant south of Eugene to assure continued construction work there.

THIRD DEATH RESULTS FROM RAINIER CRASH

Rainier, Ore., Oct. 13 (AP)—The death toll in a grade crossing collision between an S. P. & S. train and a gravel truck here reached three when Victor Zimmermann, 31, Rainier, driver of the truck, died of burns in Coville hospital at Longview late Monday.

Others killed were Arne Brumala, 32, and Wallace Terway, 25, both of Astoria.

TALLON CLEARED DRIVING CHARGE

The jury in the appeal case of Carl P. Tallon, charged with reckless driving, was out less than an hour this morning to return a verdict finding Tallon not guilty.

The case was tried last week but not quite finished Saturday and its conclusion was continued over this morning, the jury going out right after court convened. Appeal was taken by Tallon from a sentence in city recorder's court to 90 days in jail, \$300 fine and revocation of operator's license. The charge grew out of a collision May 17 at Commercial and Center streets. Willis Wakefield was operating the other car in which Helen Lama was riding as a passenger. She sustained injuries, which resulted in her death the day after the accident.

Raymond Koech, Enterprise, and Jack Leomey, Albany, state champions, and George Justice, Enterprise, state president, and Robert Stula, Clatskanie, vice-president, made the three-week trip, financed by Portland business men, accompanied by Warren E. Crabtree, Silverton, agricultural instructor. More than 3000 Future Farmers will attend the convention.

ACCIDENTAL BULLET FATAL TO ERICKSON

Portland, Oct. 13 (AP)—Fritz Erickson, 43, was dead today from a 22-calibre rifle bullet wound in head. Investigators believed the gun had been discharged accidentally as Erickson crawled through a barbed-wire fence. The accident occurred yesterday near Linnean Junction when Erickson, a cement worker, was cutting hunting skunks he believed were taking his chickens. He is survived by his widow and three children.

QUARTERS SOUGHT FOR WOLF CREEK CROW

Portland, Ore., Oct. 13 (AP)—E. J. Griffith, state WPA superintendent, began looking for a site to erect living quarters for workers on the Wolf Creek highway project.

He said the point where Washington, Clatsop, Tillamook and Columbia counties join was the most probable location.

The camp will be built to permit workers to live at the job instead of traveling to work each day by truck.

JACKSON COUNTY HAS 20,692 REGISTERED

Medford, Ore., Oct. 13 (AP)—Total registration for Jackson county was given at 20,692 when the county clerk checked the final figures.

The clerk estimated 85 per cent of the 2048 increase was democratic. The count by parties has not been completed.

GERMANY FILES PROTEST OVER HITLER INSULT

retary-general of the French communist party, during party rallies in Alsace-Lorraine.

He insisted the conversation between Dirk Forster, the German charge, and Paul Bargeton, director of political and commercial affairs for the French foreign office, was "entirely friendly."

A spokesman for the German embassy, however, said Berlin took a serious attitude toward the communist campaign in Alsace-Lorraine and looked for a quick "explanation" from Premier Blum's government.

The Germans cited an agreement whereby France and Germany undertook to avoid political demonstrations along the frontier and indicated they believed the Blum government should have banned all communist meetings.

The German protest was made orally by Forster because Count Johannes von Welzeck, the ambassador, was on vacation.

German officials took exception to two "incidents" at the Strasbourg meeting.

The first was Thores' alleged statement that French communists "prefer an honorable negro to a dishonorable Hitler" and an asserted misquotation of the reichsfuehrer's winter relief speech delivered in Germany October 8.

The second, German officials declared, was the use of a cartoon at the partisan session which showed the following picture:

A red-nosed Hitler sitting on a building with crumbling columns labelled culture, religion and art with a skeleton in uniform on one side of the chancellor who held an olive branch in one hand and the other raised in a fascist salute. A blood-red dagger was between Hitler's teeth.

Thores was charged with reading passages from Hitler's book "Mein Kampf" (My Struggle) to support his contention that "communism alone raise their voice against Hitler who seeks only to isolate and conquer France."

The German protest added a concrete international complication to the "lost provinces" dispute between communists and rightists.

Before the week-end speeches, there were reports at Strasbourg—subsequently denied from Berlin—that Hitler's black-coated "S S men" reinforced the German border guard.

DRUNK DRIVING CASES POSTPONED

The drunk driving cases of William H. Doughty and A. W. Lightfoot which were scheduled for trial in circuit court October 8 and 14 respectively have been continued to the middle of November. Both cases were appealed by the defendants from the Salem police court.

The jury today returned a verdict of not guilty in the reckless driving case of Carl Patrick Tallon and City Attorney Paul R. Hendricks said he would this afternoon move for dismissal of the Willis Wakefield case, also charged with reckless driving. These cases also were appealed from police court. The charges against the two men grew out of the same accident which resulted in a fatality.
