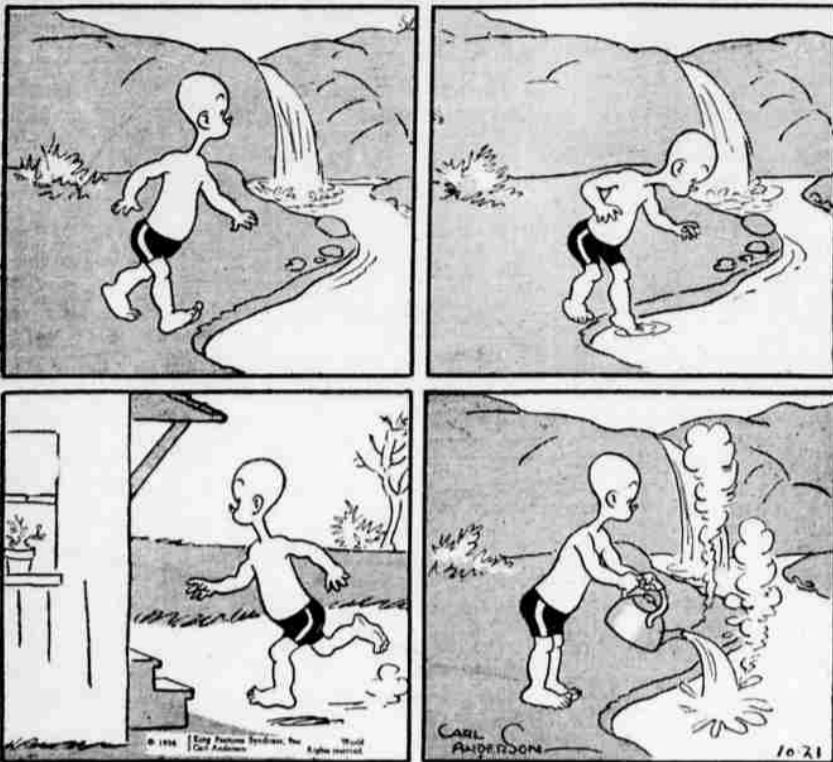


HENRY By Carl Anderson

What is an allocation? G.H. A. It is an address, the term's being particularly applied to certain addresses made by the pope to the cardinals. Q. What is the average weight of a baby at birth? C.R. A. The average weight of the male new born child is 7 pounds 11 ounces; of the female 7 pounds 4 ounces. Q. How many people visited Yellowstone national park daily this past summer? M.T. A. From June 18 to September 26, 1936, the daily average was 4,048. Q. Do England and Japan get part of the sealskins taken at the Pribilof islands? V.G. A. According to international treaty, Great Britain and Japan are entitled to a certain part of the catch of sealskins, but their shares are sold by the United States government for them. Q. Was Anne Hathaway older than Shakespeare? C.J. A. She was nearly eight years his senior. Q. When was the city in Russia named after the late Maxim Gorki? R.W. A. In 1932 the writer's birthplace, Nizhni-Novgorod, was renamed Gorki. Q. How much did Robert Louis Stevenson pay for Modestine, his celebrated donkey? W.W. A. He paid "65 francs and a glass of brandy." He traveled with the donkey 11 days. Q. What was the paid attendance at the Yankee-Cardinal world series of 1926? E.R. A. There was an attendance of 328,051 at the seven games paying \$1,207,864. Q. In what part of New England is there a house made entirely of paper? W.P.C. A. At Pleasant Cove, Mass., there is a house made entirely of Boston newspapers. Q. How much damage is caused in the United States by termites? E.S. A. The annual damage caused by termites is estimated at approximately \$37,000,000. Q. What were the names of the ships in Admiral Perry's squadron when he went to Japan in 1853? B.P.D. A. The four ships which Admiral Perry took on his first trip to Japan in 1853 were the following: The Mississippi and Susquehanna (steam frigates) and the Plymouth and Saratoga (sloops of war). Perry was in command of the squadron and had the rank of commodore. He was on board the Susquehanna.

Q. Who are the officers in The Masquers in Hollywood? T.K. A. The officers and incumbents are as follows: Harlequin, Frank Morgan; Pierrot, Charles Chase; Pochinello, Charles Miller; Croesna, Jacques Pierre; Pantaloon, William Davidson; reader, Frank Campeau. Instead of a board of directors or governors, this club has a juristate. Q. Has Mongolism any particular connection with the Mongolian race? E.M. A. He was United States minister to Spain from 1842 to 1846. Q. Please give a list of famous philosophers of all time. J.T. A. Such a list would include Rudolf Hermann Lotze, William James, Arthur Schopenhauer, John Locke, Herbert Spencer, Immanuel Kant, George W. F. Hegel, John Stuart Mill and John Dewey. Q. Is it true that the founder of Johns Hopkins university sold whiskey? E.W. A. Johns Hopkins at the beginning of his career dealt in groceries, farm products and Maryland whiskey. Q. How high is the center of the big tent in Ringling Brothers Circus? E.H. A. The greatest height from the ground to the peak (at the center pole) is approximately 48 feet. This height decreases to 16 feet at the side walls. Q. Is the Queen Mary to have a sister ship? L.H. A. There is to be one which will have approximately the same dimensions and speed as the Queen Mary. The contemplated ship will be known temporarily as Number 552. Q. Do the lights dim in Ossining when electrocutions take place at Sing Sing? C.W. A. The current is made for Sing Sing prison in a power plant which furnishes electricity for the prison. A special line runs from the dynamo to the electric chair. 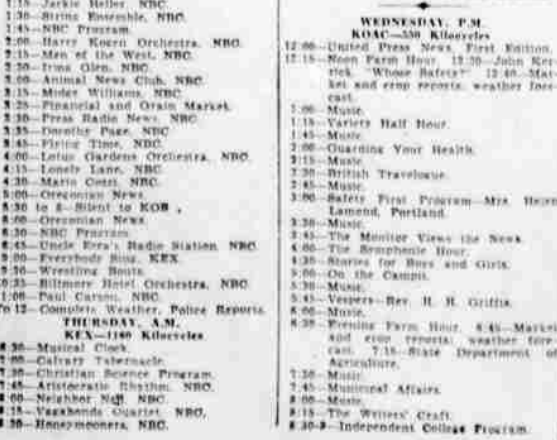

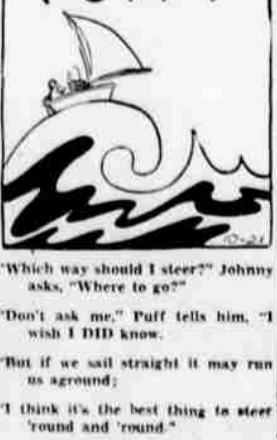
