Dallas-The state of Oregon prov do be the successful bidder Pri-day night when bids were opened providing for the refunding of the city water works bond issue. The bonds are due to mature in ten years time in 1946 but are expected to be retired in much less time than that provided for. The state's bid was 100.11 per hundred, 2 per cent on the first \$39,000.00 and 2½ per cent on the remaining \$31,000, the total issue being for \$70,000.
