Salem W. C. T. U. Conclave Hostess

The 44th annual convention of Marion county W.C.T.U. was held Tuesday, November 10, in the W.C.T.U. hall, Salem Union entertainment. Mrs. Necla Buck, state W.C.T.U. president, gave the main address, stressing the new plans of work for the year, among them the new membership plan, when each state in the union is to take for its study a foreign country. Oregon's study is Korea, this being in preparation for the World's convention which will be held in Washington, D. C., June 3-8, 1937. Each member securing one new member will be a courtier; five or more members known as an ambassador of good will. The motto is "We'll Tell the World!"

Officers elected for the year were Mrs. Lydia Lehman, president; Mrs. Jennie Nunn, vice president; Mrs. Avis Cannon, recording secretary; Mrs. Mildred Gillette, corresponding secretary; and Mrs. Jennie McClellan, treasurer.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

"1. We reaffirm our stand for total abstinence from alcoholic beverages.

"2. We believe that the best way to educate the public is to make known the nature and effects of alcohol and to expose the hypocrisy and hypocrisy of the program of the liquor interests, falsely called a 'temperance' program."

"3. Gambling: We oppose the legislation of lotteries or other forms of gambling, or matter for what purpose, as subversive to the best interests of society."

"4. Constitutional Government: We believe in the Constitution of the United States of America and in our representative form of government. We believe that neither executive nor judicial branches should seek to change the Constitution."

"5. Youth: Our educational program is designed to offer young people a better understanding of modern problems, and we recommend to them the activities and studies of our Youth's Temperance council."

"6. Narcotics: We believe that the federal government and the states should cooperate in uniform legislation for the prohibition of narcotics, including opium, heroin, morphine, cocaine and marihuana. We urge greater concern on the part of teachers, parents and civic organizations to protect the youth from exploitation by distributors of these drugs."

"7. Peace: We reaffirm our conviction that difficulties between nations should be settled by conference and judicial action, and that by the building of warships we can not promote friendships."
