HAUK'S SQUAD TO OPEN PLAY AGAINST GRADS

Although the squad will be lacking in experience insofar as first string competition is concerned, Salem high school's basketball club is expected to make a favorable showing during the season which will have its inception against the alumni Wednesday night of this week.

Otto Skopli, sole survivor of last year's entrance in the state tournament, was dropped from the squad Saturday because of alleged secret society affiliations. Announcement was made by Principal Fred Wolf.

However, the loss of Skopli will not be too severe, since Medley, Gallaher and Lowe are capable forwards. Medley and Gallaher were members of last year's B string. Maerz, another member of last season's second string, has been worked in the center position. Chambers and Hill have been alternating between center and guards, while Litwiller, Wickens and Upston are the most promising of the guards. Upston is an excellent ball handler and seldom gets tied up.

Ozell Quesseth, Willamette university freshman, is assembling a group of former wearers of the red and black for Wednesday night's contest. He is expected to select his squad from Salem high graduates of recent years. Following Wednesday night's encounter the squad will take a brief vacation, working out occasionally during the holidays. They will play Willamette freshmen January 5 and then will enter a schedule which will take them through January and February.

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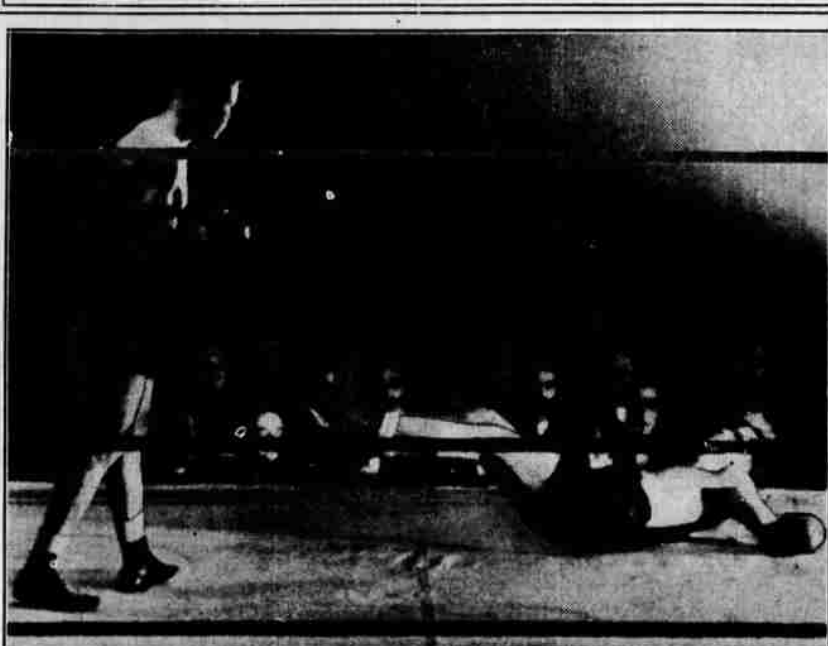

Boston 'Gold Sox' Carry Off Booby Prize 1936; Joe Louis Places 2nd

New York, Dec. 21 (AP)—Boston's "Gold Sox," who ran sixth in the American league pennant derby after being picked to finish 1-2, carry off the booby prize for 1936, so far as the sports experts are concerned.

Thirty-one out of 83 writers in the Associated Press annual poll rated the Boston ball club as the year's No. 1 disappointment, taking into consideration all sports as well as individual and team competition.

On points, the Red Sox led their only series challenger, Joe Louis, 93 to 41 in the contest for the poll's most dubious distinction. Eleven experts put the brown bomber at the top, because of his knockout by Max Schmeling, an event already rated as the year's biggest combined come-back and upset.

Disappointments or "flops" marked every branch of sporting activity, judging by the nation-wide returns. Next to the Red Sox in baseball, the Chicago Cubs were rated the biggest disappointment to their followers. The Detroit Tigers, picked by most critics to repeat in the American league, and the St. Louis Cardinals' pitching staff also were cited.

College football's disappointments depended largely upon the sectional point of view. Ohio State's Buckeyes, for failing to be national title contenders, got the most mention, but the Iowa, Kentucky, Georgia Tech, St. Mary's and Fordham gridiron aggregations also were considered "built up for a let down."

Failure of the American Olympic committee to reinstate the backstroke swimming queen, Eleanor Holm Jarrett, was voted the main disappointment in connection with the big games in Germany.

Oregon Makes Raid California Quints

San Francisco, Dec. 21 (AP)—University of Oregon's basketball team opens a week's invasion of northern California tonight against San Jose State college Spartans.

Tomorrow night the Webfeet play University of California at Berkeley, and Wednesday night they meet Chico State college at Chico.

The Oregon quintet is comprised of Laddie Gale and Dave Silver, six-foot four inch forwards; Slim Wintermute, six foot eight center; and Bob Anet and Wally Johanson, guards.

PORTLAND AND SALEM DIVIDE ROUND ROBINS

Honors were divided by Salem and Portland horshoe pitchers in two round robins at the Salem club house yesterday. In the class A event Luke Donaldson of Salem won the turkey in a play-off with Lee Wright of Portland. In the class B event Jack Smith of Portland was the turkey winner in a play-off with Jack Campbell of Salem.

Three games were necessary in the Donaldson-Wright play-off, the Portland southpaw youngster winning the first and Donaldson the next two. For these three games Wright made a finer percentage of 55.5 to Donaldson's 54. For the entire meet, however, Donaldson led the field with a general ringer average of 55.6 with Wright second at 53.2 per cent.

In the class B games Smith of Portland easily led the field in ringer average with 46.3 per cent and didn't lose a game all day.

As the double meet neared its conclusion it was apparent that Donaldson and Wright were tied in class A, and Smith and Campbell in class B, so it wasn't necessary for all players to play all scheduled games. This explains why the summary does not show an equal number of games by all players prior to the play-offs. Donaldson and Wright also tied in the round robin played just before Thanksgiving. Donaldson winning the turkey in the play-off at that time.
