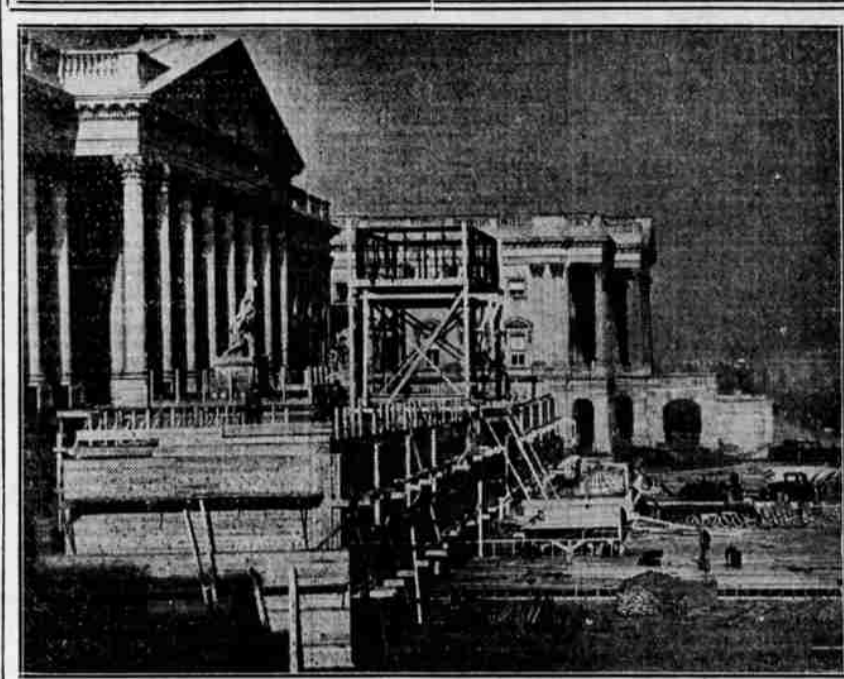
Continuation of—Needy Children

SEAMAN SIMPSON SAILS WEDNESDAY

Berlin, Dec. 21 (AP)—Lawrence Simpson, American seaman sentenced to three years in prison on treason charges, was a "guest" at the Bremen city jail today awaiting the liner President Roosevelt on which he is to sail on parole Wednesday.
Simpson was transferred yesterday from Bremen penitentiary to the jail.
Fuhrer Adolf Hitler granted executive clemency to Simpson, who has served 17 months in prison, most of it awaiting trial.
It was uncertain whether Simpson would sail as a working member of the crew or an unofficial guest of the United States line, as the President Roosevelt is carrying no passengers because of the American shipping strike.

SECURITY ACT EXPLAINED BY DIVISION CHIEF

Much confusion in the minds of employers who are affected by the provisions of the social security act could be cleared away if it were kept in mind that sections 8 and 9 of the act are entirely separate and have no bearing on each other. R. W. Wade, chief of the social security division, internal revenue department, Portland, advised members of the Salem chamber of commerce Monday noon. Section 8 has to do with old age insurance where the employer and employee each contribute one per cent of the wages involved. Section 9 deals with unemployment insurance in organizations where 8 or more persons are employed. For the present the entire tax falls upon the management.
Taking up the compulsory angle of the old age security act, the speaker points out that the employers are required to withhold one per cent of the employees' wages and if he fails to do this he is held accountable.
Wade made a plea for complete and exact records, pointing out that these records will be on file for many years, therefore should be accurate. He said that the government would not dictate as to the method each employer should use in keeping his records, merely requiring that all information should be available when requested.
Social security headquarters will be established in Salem before the first of the year. Postmaster Henry Crawford stated, following Wade's address.

SANTA CLAUS GETS RIDE AT LEBANON

Lebanon—Representatives of seven of the largest school districts of Linn county are meeting in Shedd Monday to outline plans for the cooperative employment of a county health nurse, \$1,000 of whose salary will be paid by the county court and the balance by the school districts. Arthur Farnum, of the Lebanon high school, and Harry Palmer of the Sweet Home schools, are acting for the committee in drawing up plans. It is thought the nurse may be employed soon after January 1. County Judge J. J. Barrett said about \$1700 would have to be raised by the school districts, of which there are 141.
