

# NEW STAYTON CITY COUNCIL IS FACING GOOD YEAR

## BONDED DEBTS SHOW DECLINE; CASH ON HAND

Stayton—The city of Stayton moves into the new year in better financial condition than for the past several seasons, with the bonded debt rapidly being reduced, needed improvements being made and the bank balance materially increasing.

This was the report made to the city council Tuesday night by George R. Duncan, recorder, as the recorded officials took office for another term. The committee appointments for the new year will be announced at the next meeting by Mayor George A. Smith.

The officers who were formally sworn in for new terms last Tuesday night include Aldermen O. M. Baker and Everett C. Downing; City Recorder George R. Duncan and City Treasurer A. C. VanNoy. Mayor Smith was absent. Everett Gardner and Harry Rowe are the hold-over members of the council.

The city has a bank balance of approximately \$2,000 at the start of the new year, City Recorder Duncan reported.

"The city is in fine financial condition," he said. "This bank balance is shown regardless of the expenditures for the construction of the new city hall and the large sums expended for street improvements."

"Applications for WPA assistance are in the process of approval for two important projects in Stayton during the coming season. Several hundred feet of sidewalk and curbing is to be constructed and the new city park is to be improved. This will afford employment for many of the local men and will enhance the value of Stayton property."

The aldermen were notified that notices of compromise in the drive to collect more than \$8,000 outstanding Bancroft bond liens had been sent to property owners. The bonds were floated several years ago for the pavement of city streets. According to the terms of the council, property owners are being given in effect, approximately a 20 per cent adjustment on the indebtedness.

At present the city bonded debt is \$16,000 of which \$1,000 is to be paid shortly.

The council members took action on complaints arising from the parking of large delivery and freight trucks on the main street of the town. It was the contention of the aldermen that such a practice was a traffic hazard and should be halted. Legislation, consistent with this stand, is to be passed at the next session of the council if the practice is not curtailed, the aldermen indicated. It was the opinion of the council members that all deliveries should be made through the alley entrance to the stores.

Marshall Charles Porter, who also holds the posts of street commissioner and water fee collector, drew opposition for his posts at the council session when North Smith, formerly deputy sheriff, applied for the positions. No action was taken on either application at the meeting this week.

## LINN COUNTY'S SCHOOL CENSUS HAS INCREASE

Albany—Because of an increase of nearly 8 percent in the so-called school population of Linn county, the Denny school near Lebanon, abandoned last fall, is being resumed and one other abandoned school may be re-opened. County School Superintendent J. M. Bennett said.

The increase is revealed by the annual Linn county school census, completed recently. The Denny school remained closed last fall though the required number of children for maintenance of a school was available in the district. The district decided, it was explained, that it would be more economical to send these children to the Sand Ridge school. Now, Mr. Bennett says, the Denny district has 15 pupils.

The census total shows residing in the county now 8164 children between the ages of 4 and 20 years. Of these 4150 are boys and 4014 girls. The census for the previous year gave a total of 3889 boys and 3854 girls, or 7753 in all. The increase of boys is 251 and of girls 180.

Mr. Bennett ascribes the sharp increase to arrival of new residents in the county rather than to an increased birth rate.

These census figures constitute the basis of apportioning the state elementary and irreducible school fund proceeds.

## WINE, BEER SALES REDUCED ONE HOUR

Corvallis—Sale of beer and wines here will be halted in the city at midnight each night instead of at 1 o'clock as is stipulated by the state liquor commission at the present time. This was decided at the final scheduled meeting of the old city council and will go into effect after the ordinance covering the matter has been drawn up by the ordinance committee.

It was agreed that most of the trouble caused here by drinking occurs in the hour between midnight and 1 o'clock.
