Oregon State didn't waste much time after Hergert had made up his mind and Coach Howard Maple went to Portland Tuesday to take the young man to Corvallis. Hergert's decision to join up with the Beavers is just another illustration of the ability of the state schools to outbid the private institutions for athletes. One can hardly blame the young men for taking advantage of the attractive offers coming their way. Nevertheless there is some advantage of not having too many strings attached to a student when he enters college.

Gordon M. Quarnstrom, columnist for the Walla Walla Bulletin, pokes fun at a recent press dispatch which credits Linfield college with declaring it "withdrew from the Northwest conference after finding dissatisfaction with the management." "Linfield withdrew, all right," Quarnstrom points out, "but their withdrawal was not wholly voluntary, as those who have been familiar with Northwest conference affairs will know. If you've ever had a door slammed in your face, you understand how Linfield withdrew."

Almost perfect conditions prevail for winter sports at Government camp. Temperatures have been well below freezing and snow has reached a depth where skiing is a pleasure. For the benefit of those who do not care to make the eight mile drive from Government camp to timber line, a bus service has been established, with a 30 cent fare each way. WOODBURN RALLIES TO BEAT NEWBERG

Woodburn—The Woodburn Bulldogs edged out a 31-23 decision over Newberg last night. The Woodburn team dropped behind at the opening of the game and were trailing 13-7 at half-time. They came back after the intermission with a barrage of baskets and forged into a four point lead before Newberg scored their first point of the second half. The Bulldogs were greatly hampered by the Newberg floor which explained for their inability to score in the first two periods. Shaw, Woodburn guard, took high scoring honors by caging 14 points, 12 of them in the final half. Boss led the Newberg quintet with 8. A total of 29 fouls, 13 of which were called on Woodburn, marred an otherwise speedy game.

The Bulldog "B" team remained undefeated in their league games by taking the Tiger "B" team 7-6. With Woodburn trailing 6-5 late in the game, Bob Renn, Woodburn center, picked up a loose ball and dribbled half the length of the floor to lay in the winning basket. He was also the hero of the Silverton game with two nice shots at timely moments.

Next Friday the Bulldogs go to Molalla for a clash with the Indians.

KEENE SQUAD LOSES CONTEST WITH TEACHERS

Willamette university's bearcats, who have just about broken even in basketball so far this season, taking wins and losses into consideration, will try their luck against the "Fighting Angels" from Mt. Angel college tonight at 8 o'clock. The game will be played on Willamette's floor. During unofficial scrimmages Willamette outplayed the Angels. The latter, however, had little difficulty in beating Albany early this week.

Coach Keene's men ran into a strong aggregation of teachers at Monmouth last night when they dropped a 38 to 27 decision on the Oregon Normal school floor. The loss was the sixth straight Willamette has dropped to the Wolves in recent years.

Willamette held a lead for a brief period during the first portion of last night's contest but the Wolves quickly hit the victory trail and held a fairly safe lead thereafter.

Jack Alton, sophomore cager, gave the Willamette reserves a hair raising 23 to 22 decision over the second string teachers when he centered the hoop from a long distance during closing seconds of play.

Salem High Wins over Tillamook, 25-12; Play Roseburg, Medford Next

Holding their opponents to two field goals, both during the final period, Salem high school hoopsters won over Tillamook high last night 25 to 12. It was the fourth consecutive win for the Vikings, who will leave Thursday morning for Roseburg. They play Roseburg Thursday night and Medford Friday and Saturday evenings.

The Cheesemakers had numerous opportunities to score, but had little luck in centering the hoop. They scored two points from the gift line in the first period and added a third in the second quarter, to leave the floor at the intermission 11 to 3. Medley scored eight of his team's total during the first half, stealing the ball on two occasions and dashing two-thirds the length of the floor to score. A few moments later he scored two additional baskets on swing shots. Maynard, who improves as the season progresses, connected for a free shot to garner the only point scored by Salem in the second period.

At three-quarter time Salem was out in front 16 to 5 and when it appeared Tillamook was to be shut out insofar as floor goals were concerned Page turned and potted one. Coach Hauk shifted players freely in an effort to secure a little more drive. The Vikings were slow in breaking for their basket after securing the ball and at times had difficulty in getting across the center-ship. Referee Max Allen was forced to call "steps" and "running with the ball" on both sides many times.

JEWES OBJECT TO FIGHT ON MONEY BASIS

Palm Springs, Calif., Jan. 13 (AP)—Samuel Untermeyer of New York, president of the non-sectarian Anti-Nazi league, declared today the organization was boycotting the proposed Max Schmeling-Jimmy Bradcomb heavyweight bout because "Schmeling would take his share of the money back to Germany."

"We are not boycotting the fight itself," said Untermeyer. "But we do not believe it is right for anyone from that country to take American money back to Germany."

Untermeyer, who is also president of the non-sectarian Anti-Nazi World Council, is spending the winter here.

"We don't want to interfere with the fight itself if the money stays here. We don't want the money, but we don't want it sent to Germany."

COUGARS DROP BEAVERS AGAIN

Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 13 (AP)—A victory-hungry Oregon State basketball team settled down to hard work in preparation for the University of Oregon game today after dropping two close contests to the Washington State Cougars.

The Webfoots will come here Friday night. Washington State won last night's encounter 37 to 32 in a fast game not at all like the previous night's game in which Oregon State tossed in but three field goals and yet lost only by three points—23 to 20.

Two free throws gave the Beavers an early lead, but a basket by Nelson—his only one of the period—soon tied it up and a spurt gave the Cougars a six-point margin. By half time, the home team was back in the running on the short end of a 14 to 13 count.

Early in the final frame, the Beavers took a one-point lead on Tuttle's gift shot—16 to 15—but Nelson, high scorer of the night before, broke away for three more baskets to lead the Cougar spurt to victory.

Portland, Jan. 13 (AP)—Survivors of grueling three-round bouts in the second annual far west Diamond Belt boxing championships faced their final tests tonight in three matches in each of the eight weight divisions.

Only four entrants remained in each division. Winners of the initial fracas tonight will get a few minutes' rest and then take on finalists for top honors.

More than 2000 sports fans saw last night's battles—27 of them. Knockouts were far from uncommon. Three bouts went by default. Leading in interest was the college rivalry between Lake Purcell, University of Idaho, and Paul Waller, chunky entrant from Washington State, fighting in the 135-pound class. Waller, a Kellogg, Idaho, product, piled up a lead which Purcell's spectacular last-round rally failed to overcome.
