SIMPSON HELD ON SUSPICION

Redding, Cal., Jan. 13 (AP)—Suspicion of the story told by a motorist whose windshield was blood-stained, police today held a man as an alleged suspect in the Mattson kidnapping case.

The man who gave the name of John G. Simpson and said he was from Los Angeles, was stopped here when officers noticed bloodstains on his windshield. He said the stains resulted from his efforts to help a woman in a wreck north of Salem, Ore.

Simpson admitted, police said, that he was in Everett, Wash., near the field where the body of Charles Mattson was found, recently. Police said Simpson was of dark complexion, six feet tall and weighed 160 pounds. They wired authorities in other cities to check the story he told.

The man mentioned in the above dispatch is doubtless Paul Simpson of Los Angeles who took Mrs. Merle Long to Salem General hospital after she and Mr. Long had been fatally injured last Saturday afternoon. Simpson is a Los Angeles plumber and had been to Everett and other Washington places. He gave out a signed statement while here that the Greyhound stage with which the Long car collided had previously overtaken him while he was traveling about 40 miles an hour.

NEGRO HELD IN BATH TUB CASE

New York, Jan. 13 (AP)—The bath-tub slaying of pretty Mrs. Mary Robinson Case came to a swift and unexpected denouement today when investigators seized a 33-year-old Harlem negro and charged him with the crime.

Thirty-six hours after the 25-year-old housewife was strangled and beaten to death in her Jackson Heights, Queens, apartment, District Attorney Charles P. Sullivan announced that Major Greene, a negro employed in the apartment building, had been charged with the woman's murder.

Greene, who previously had been questioned and then released, was arrested at his home in Harlem, and taken to the apartment where Frank Case, 30-year-old hotel supply company employee, found the battered body of his wife Monday.

Greene was kept there two hours and then taken to the Newtown police station. Greene's brother, Henry, 23, and William Henry Johnson, also a negro, also were questioned. Johnson and Major Greene were employed at the Jackson Heights Bachelors' club overlooking the Case apartment from an adjacent wing in the same building.

Carl Ramsden, Salem, and Gordon Skinner, Salem, at State and High.

By error, the Capital Journal a few days ago mentioned the name of Esther Swartz in connection with the Gottfried Paulus case in circuit court. The name of the woman who was involved in the case was Esther Silvers, who, since the affair that led to the case, has been married to Gene Gosser.

L. H. Hook took 24 hours in which to decide on his plea when he was haled into justice court today on a charge of larceny of two head of cattle from Raleigh Harold. He failed to furnish \$500 bail and is held in jail.

The Federated Music clubs of the city will provide a program of music in the lobby of the Y.M.C.A. next Friday night at 8 o'clock. Each teacher affiliated with the organization will provide one student for the program, making 16 numbers in all. Vocal, piano and violin music will predominate. Mrs. Walter Denton is in charge of arranging the program.

Possibility that the Salem school board may obtain a site for a senior high school in the southern part of the city was visioned during last night's board meeting. Recently W. C. Conner, owner of a tract adjacent to the Leslie junior high ground, made a proposal to trade his property for the Park and Lincoln school grounds. Approvals of the property involved made by the Salem Realty board, place a valuation of \$7500 on Conner's land and house and \$9000 and \$3500 on the Lincoln and Park blocks respectively.

PEDDLERS SHOT WITH FANFARE

Peiping, China, Jan. 13 (AP)—An estimated 50,000 onlookers watched five narcotics peddlers executed today on the broad steps of the world-famous Temple of Heaven.

The executions were the second in China's anti-narcotics crusade and were performed with gruesome fanfare.

The thousands of witnesses watched intently but with no sign of emotion as the condemned men, shackled and bound, were forced to kneel in front of the rifle squads and be killed with bullets through their skulls.

The almost ceremonial killing started with a bonfire of 10,000 ounces of assorted narcotics which were seized after the "be cured by New Year's or die" drive started this month.

After the contraband had been burned, the shackled prisoners were dragged to the scene and forced to pose for photographs for use by the authorities in their crusade.

"Take all you want," one victim shouted hysterically. The others cringed in silence.

The bodies were dumped unceremoniously into crude coffins stacked nearby and carted to the municipal "cemetery for criminals."

The crowd collected hours before the executions and watched the ceremonial fire, which burned two hours, its smoke darkening Peiping's cloudless, blue sky.

HOUSE UPHOLDS ASSIGNMENTS

Washington, Jan. 13 (AP)—In the first test of its strength, the huge democratic house majority today approved committee assignments despite charges of unfairness by progressive and farmer-laborite spokesmen.

The standing vote was announced as 235 to 10.

Republicans joined with the democrats in approving the assignments. Republican assignments will be made tomorrow or Friday.

Rep. Gerald J. Boleau (Prog.-Wis.), floor leader of the combined progressive-farmer labor bloc, in a fiery one hour speech charged that democratic leaders had not fulfilled an agreement to increase third party committee assignments.

"We got only 30 percent of the representation to which we are entitled," Boleau roared, contending his bloc should be recognized as a minority party on the same percentage basis as the republicans.

Rep. John McCormack (D., Mass.) member of the house ways and means committee, defended the assignments, charging that progressive and farmer-laborites are purely "state parties."

BAN ON DEFICIENCY JUDGMENTS ASKED

A measure providing for cancellation of deficiency judgments in foreclosure proceedings has been introduced in the Oregon legislature today by Representative Ray Antrim of Washington county.

A similar measure passed by the regular 1935 session was vetoed by the governor. Antrim stated objectional features had been removed from this measure and he believed it constitutional.

Representative Ellis Barnes of Portland dropped several proposals dealing with the state parole system into the copper. The measure provided a closer cooperation between states in the supervision of parolees.

Canvas was stretched about the machine to shield it from the curious and a state patrol squad car was placed so as to preclude anyone from seeing under or around the enclosure.

The car held by the Everett police was stolen from Verne Williams of Everett early last Friday night and its theft reported shortly after 6 o'clock that evening. It was parked in front of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Victor Forslund on North Hoyt some time after midnight Sunday.

She and Mr. Forslund returned home after that hour from a call on friends and both she and Mr. Forslund are confident it was not there when they went into their home. A front door of the machine, a very dark gray Chevrolet, was left ajar.

The marks of the impounded car are reported to resemble those on the automobile that officers believe carried the Mattson boy to the brush covered area south of Everett.

Some of the passengers who had been joking with me a minute before were lying sprawled in the aisle.

Little Jimmie Long, 11 months old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Merle G. Long who lost their lives in an automobile accident last Saturday afternoon, is to be adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Gardner Knapp of Salem, Mrs. Knapp is a sister of the late Mrs. Long.

Double funeral services for Mr. and Mrs. Long were held yesterday afternoon at the Clough-Barrett chapel, with Rev. Grover C. Birchett of First Presbyterian church as the minister and interment in Belcrest Memorial park.

As tributes to the popular young couple a great profusion of flowers was banked about the chapel. Attendance overflowed the chapel. A delegation from Mr. Long's fraternity, Phi Delta Theta, came from Oregon State college. William Wright sang.

MEXICAN PLANE HOPE ABANDONED

Mexico City, Jan. 13 (AP)—Hope virtually was abandoned today for 12 persons aboard two airplanes missing in wild country near Minatitlan, Vera Cruz.

The first plane to disappear was a Mexican Aviation company airliner with six passengers and a crew of three aboard. It was lost Monday either in marshlands or high mountains near Minatitlan, which it was approaching on a flight from Mexico City.

The other plane, privately owned, carried two passengers and a pilot. It apparently was last heard from shortly after the larger liner dropped from view but was not reported missing until today.

Army and civilian planes, already hunting the first plane, widened the search over lofty mountains in Vera Cruz state. Other rescue parties composed of soldiers and guides on horseback penetrated the jungles and swamps near Minatitlan.

STAMPS MAY BE CLUE TO MURDER

Portland, Ore., Jan. 13 (AP)—The person who placed an envelope of stamps beneath the door of the Patrick J. Kelly store last Saturday might be of great aid in bringing to justice the person who shot and killed Kelly and stole \$600, officials said today.

Deputy District Attorney Collier said the envelope ordinarily was kept in a missing cash box, and that if the finder could lead officers to other contents of the box they would have as a clue the direction which the killer took in his flight.

The Kelly store is at Sylvan four miles west of this city. Kelly was slain Friday night. Clues have been meagre.

London, Jan. 13 (AP)—Offerings at the wool auction today totaled \$957,000, of which \$400 were sold. The good selection offered met an active demand, and practically all were sold. The home trade bought liberally, and foreign buyers, including Germany, were active bidders. Prices were firm as compared with yesterday.

Looking to the north the extent of the early morning fire at Jefferson can be seen. Damage is estimated around \$25,000 with losses partially covered by insurance. At the right is Joseph G. Fontaine, of Smith & Fontaine, owners of the largest store to be destroyed. He plans to rebuild his store as soon as possible.

DAM MACHINIST KILLED IN CRASH

Portland, Jan. 13 (AP)—Alex Klok, 53, machinist at Bonneville dam, lost his life today when his automobile skidded on the slush-covered highway, plunged over a 300-foot cliff and landed in the Sandy river.

The position of the body in the submerged car first led sheriff's deputies to believe there was more than one victim. They found no other occupants when highway engineers pulled the car onto the bank. Klok's wife said her husband frequently picked up fellow workers on his way to the dam from Portland.

The car dropped into six feet of water. Burning headlights were still visible under the water when the officers arrived. They immediately identified the car as Klok's from a license plate knocked off in the crash.

TO IMPROVE PLANE WEATHER REPORTING

Washington, Jan. 14 (AP)—Chairman Royal S. Copeland of the senate commerce committee announced today his air safety subcommittee would recommend shortly expenditure of probably \$10,000,000 to improve airplane weather reporting facilities.

Copeland's announcement was made as government air regulatory agencies spurred efforts toward increased air safety as a result of a series of disastrous recent air transport fatalities.

Copeland criticized the present bureau of air commerce, asserting there was "fundamental defects" in its organization.

Washington, Jan. 13 (AP)—The public health service said today that telegraphic advices from 35 states pushed reported cases of influenza to 12,143 for the week ended Jan. 9.

Aggregate cases for the same states in the previous week were set at 3,993.

Officials emphasized that some of the reports were incomplete, and added that cases throughout the country might be substantially above the listed totals.

MRS. LANDON GLAD TO LIVE ON NEW FARM

Topeka, Kas., Jan. 13 (AP)—Once again "just a plain citizen" of the prairie state bid for the nation's highest honor. Mrs. Alf Landon turned her thoughts happily today toward a new adventure—life on a farm.

Announcing the purchase of a 160-acre suburban place, Mrs. Landon expressed a zest for her first taste of rural life. She confessed it would be a welcome change from the "atrocious months" during which former Governor Landon campaigned as republican presidential nominee and she was first lady of the Kansas executive mansion.

"We're going to keep a cow and some chickens," she declared. "It's going to be fun living out there."

"I am really glad to be a plain citizen again and to be able to do and say what I please. Most of all I am glad to be able to have my children play freely and happily without worrying about them." She referred to Nancy Jo, 5, and Jack, 3.

In contrast to the "fun" she anticipates on the farm, Mrs. Landon said her four years as wife of the governor of Kansas had been "interesting ones."

The Landons plan to build a Colonial style, white washed brick home containing 12 or 14 rooms on their farm. It will be furnished almost entirely with antiques collected by Mrs. Landon.

Until the new home is ready the Landons will live at the residence here of Mrs. S. E. Cobb, Mrs. Landon's mother.

NAN HONEYMAN GETS COMMITTEES

Washington, Jan. 13 (AP)—House democrats completed today their organization for the session by approving in caucus committee assignments of their 332 members, the eight progressives and five farmer-laborites.

Republicans still are working on their assignments.

Congresswoman Nan Woodhymon of Oregon received assignments to the committees on Indian affairs, irrigation and reclamation, and rivers and harbors.
