

CHOICE OF PARK SITE ANNOUNCED BY FORUM GROUP

Lebanon—A special committee of the Lebanon commercial club appointed to recommend a site for Lebanon's proposed city park has reported their choice as a 20-acre strip south of the Saniam river between the bridge and the Albany canal. The site is owned by the Mountain States Power company and its officials will be contacted for the sale of the property or a long time lease contract with option of purchasing at some future date.

Advantages of the property as outlined by Harry Howe, chairman of the committee, include proposals of improvements which may be made over a long period of time. Shade from the many large trees on the site, nearness to the river which will make a swimming pool possible and sufficient area for an athletic field and playground apparatus, were among several other assets stressed by Howe.

Some further investigation of the location is necessary before the committee presents its suggestions to the city council. If the council guards the plan with favor but is unable to arrange terms of sale or lease with the power company, the committee will examine other favorable sites.

STREET GRAVEL PROMISED Lebanon—County Judge J. J. Barrett has arranged within the next two weeks to provide Lebanon with sufficient crushed gravel for city streets. Operations of the gravel crusher have been held up for some time past pending the expected rise of the Saniam river. The need of finely crushed gravel for city streets has been a subject of discussion by the council for some time past.

LEGISLATURE CONVENES Lebanon—The first session of the county high school legislature was held in Albany Wednesday night, with 60 students from all parts of the county in attendance. Mrs. Charles Childs of Albany, originator of the plan, was chosen governor for 1937. Other officers were elected and three resolutions were passed and legislative members sworn in. Lebanon was selected as the meeting place for the next session on April 14.

PREPARING CANTATA Lebanon—The Presbyterian church choir will present an Easter cantata, "The Glory of the Garden," Easter night in the church auditorium. Mrs. Hugh Kirkpatrick is directing the music and Mrs. Jack Elliott is accompanist.

SHAKES ABE SHAKEN Lebanon—A truck load of shakes got an extra shake Thursday morning when the Holiday Feed Store scales on which the truck had been driven, suddenly collapsed due to old and rotted timbers. No injury was done since the drop was only a foot but a part of the load had to be thrown off before the truck could be driven off.

COMPLETING PROJECTS Lebanon—Of the seven improvements under way on Lebanon streets by WPA crews, six have been completed and the seventh is nearing completion with only \$194 remaining of the \$2820 provided for the work. The city council, to date, has made no move to renew the contract calling for continuance of the work. Two of the board members objected to renewal on the belief that the project would be more costly than if the city advanced its own funds. According to City Recorder Wilman, the city advanced \$1200 to meet the federal fund of \$1620. Twenty-six men have been employed on the projects under the direction of Bob Cuberson.

KIDBY IS HONORED Lebanon—Honor has come to Clifford Kidby, son of Mrs. B. C. Hunt of Lebanon, who is now attending Oregon State college. Kidby was chosen to head the Wesleyan Foundation, a campus sectarian group. He has been attending OBC for three years, having formerly attended high school in Lebanon.

PIONEER FIRM INDEPENDENCE CHANGES NAME

Independence—One of Independence's well established business firms changed hands this week, effective Monday, with C. O. Sloper, the only remaining member of the firm of Sloper Bros. and Cogle, now retiring from the hardware business having sold his interest to Francis Krieg of this city. Sloper has been connected with the hardware firm for over 24 years, and during the past five years has been sole owner. His brother, W. A. Sloper, a hop grower, and W. H. Cogle, a brother-in-law, having retired from the business in 1932. They originally bought out the Hanna Bros. hardware store that was once located at the corner of Main and C streets where Becker's meat market now stands, making the purchase in 1913.

The Sloper building in the center of the block on the west side of Main street, which has housed the hardware firm since 1928, was purchased from the late W. H. Walker in 1927. Francis Krieg, the new owner, has resided in Independence for the past six years and is well known to local residents and farmers, having had the Union Oil service station at Second and Monmouth streets for about three years. He retired from the service station last fall. The business is not new to Krieg as he had considerable experience in the hardware business in Lebanon, prior to his coming to Independence.

While Sloper has not announced his intentions for the future, he expects to remain in the store for a short time, assisting Krieg with the work and establishing him with old patrons of the firm. Other present employees will be retained on the staff, these include Norval Taylor, Gus Fisher, Dorman Newton. Sloper retains the building in which the business is located, and the new firm will continue to do business in the same location.
