## ELIHU THOMSON, INVENTOR DEAD

Swampscott, Mass., March 13 (P) - Dr. Elihu Thomson, 83, of the General Electric company, inventor of electric arc welding and contemporary of the late Thomas A. Edison, died today at his home. He had been seriously ill since January.

Last fall engineers gathered in Detroit and Lynn to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Dr. Thomson's discovery of electric welding. At that time he exchanged greetings over a special wire with the two celebrations. It was his last public activity.

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## PAIR IN OCEAN SAVED BY PLANE

Port Angeles, Wash., March 13 (UP) -Saved from the sea which they thought would be their tomb, two Tacoma fishermen were in a hospital here today after a dramatic rescue by a coast guard amphibian plane.

The men-Roy Culp and Matt Sario, members of the crew of the purse seine boat Normandie, of San Francisco-were injured and in dire need of medical attention when brought here.

Their boat sank in a collision with the S. S. Alamar off Eureka, Calif., Wednesday night. The men were rescued by another fishing boat, Wanderer II, which called for assistance from the coast guard when off the mouth of the Columbia river.

The men, with eight others, said they had to take to the Normandie's skiffs after their craft went down. Lieut. G. P. Edge piloted the coast guard plane from here and landed at sea while the injured men were placed aboard.

## PORTLAND WOMAN ACCIDENT VICTIM

Pendleton, March 13 (P) - Mrs. Ida Olmstead, about 50, of Portland, was killed instantly and Mrs. Esther Mohr of Gresham was seriously injured when an automobile operated by Allen Mohr of Gresham collided with a telephone pole in front of the Union Pacific depot at Hermiston shortly before 8 o'clock this morning.

Mr. Mohr, who suffered minor cuts and bruises, told investigating officers the car was out of control when it hit the pole. His mother-in-law, Mrs. Olmstead, was killed when her body was thrown through the windshield.

The condition of his mother, Mrs. Mohr, is not yet known as she has not regained consciousness. The party was motoring to Medical Springs to visit Mohr's wife.

Mrs. Leighty talked to Mrs. Johnson by telephone at Chicago.

"She said she was feeling as well as could be expected and intended to go to Detroit today," she said. "She didn't mention anything of a marriage and I am sure there can be no truth in the report."

Johnson, who is said to have been considered a public hero in this little Kansas town from which the two started on their world adventures, was buried here two weeks ago today.

Mrs. Johnson, still in a wheelchair because of injuries suffered in the California plane accident in which her husband was killed, attended the service and two days later resumed her lecture tour.

When she came to Chanute from Los Angeles with Johnson's body she was so overcome with emotion and grief she could not talk. During the public funeral services she sat in the wings of the auditorium stage weeping as the joint exploits of her husband and herself were extolled.

## FRENCH LOAN HELD SUCCESS

Paris, March 13 (P) -The second installment of the new national defense loan will be issued Tuesday, the ministry of finance announced today. The issue will total 2,500,000,000 francs (\$412,500,000).

The installment will carry the same interest rate and conditions as the first. Buyers were authorized to enter their subscriptions beginning today at 98 francs (\$4.41) per 100 francs for the 4 1/2 per cent bonds payable in 60 years in French or Swiss francs, dollars or pounds.

France has turned the elusive financial and political "corner," Premier Leon Blum's supporters proclaimed, as a result of the quick sale of the first installment of bonds for a 10,500,000,000-franc (about \$1,737,500,000) defense loan.

Blum's newspaper Le Populaire saluted the snapping up of the 4 1/2 per cent securities as the "rebirth of public credit."

The success of the financing exerted a pacifying influence in parliament which was expected to adjourn March 19 for the Easter vacation and reconvene in the "Exposition Truce" of May. The Paris international exposition is scheduled to open May 1.

## 3000 CHINESE DIE IN DROUGHT FAMINE

Chungking, Szechuen Province, China, March 13 (P) -An unprecedented drought, reducing two-thirds of the inhabitants of Szechuen province to the verge of starvation, has killed 3,000 persons since January 1. It was estimated today.

As in Honan province, where widespread death and suffering have been reported, thousands were believed to have died of hunger and gold in the last 60 days, despite the relief efforts of American and Canadian missionaries.

Parts of the afflicted areas have been without rain for seven months, reducing "China's garden of Eden" to hard, grassless clay. The mighty Yangtze, which usually roars through its famous scenic gorge, has dwindled to a mere trickle.

One local flour mill announced free distribution of bran flour to the poor, and five were trampled to death in the huge crowds that responded.

## Oregon Lawmakers Were News in East

Portland, March 13 (P) -C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon View, told members of a civic club here that Oregon legislators crashed front pages of eastern papers several times during the session just ended.

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## SENATORS GIVE PROS AND CONS OF COURT BILL

(By the Associated Press) Three democratic senators declared last night at a New York mass meeting that the Roosevelt court bill would curtail the independence of the judiciary. Three administration supporters, speaking in as many cities, called for adjustments in the judicial system to meet present conditions.

Senator Copeland (D., N. Y.) in New York: "If it (the Roosevelt bill) succeeds it will make the supreme court a political institution, not a court of justice."

Secretary Ickes at Raleigh, N. C.: "The supreme court is in effect a third legislative chamber - whose thinking is in terms of a by-gone generation."

Senator Walsh (D., Mass.) in New York: "Whatever its imperfections, the supreme court of the United States has been for 150 years our political refuge and strength."

Secretary Roper, at Greenville, S. C., said changed economic and social conditions had made adjustments in the nation's judicial system inevitable.

Senator Burke (D., Neb.) in New York declared the Roosevelt bill "strikes a vital blow" at states' rights, division of government power and an independent judiciary.

Senator Black (D., Ala.) in Washington predicted action soon "to change this from a government by the few, of the few and for the few, -of the judges and by the judges- to a government of the people, by the people and for the people."

## LOYD GEORGE WARNS OF FOOD SHORTAGE

London, March 13 (P) - David Lloyd George, Great Britain's wartime prime minister, warned of the food peril in any new war in dramatic terms to parliament today.

The 74-year-old veteran of many parliaments held the house of commons in rapid attention from start to finish of his 40-minute appeal.

He demanded more workers be returned to the land.

The government, he charged, is spending \$7,500,000
