

COURTESY CARS ARE AVAILABLE ALL DELEGATES

Albany—An innovation in the matter of courtesy cars is planned at the 1937 department convention of the American Legion, to be held at Albany August 12, 13 and 14, it was reported following the weekly meeting of the convention commission Tuesday.

According to plans outlined, a veritable fleet of courtesy cars will be made available, not only for officers and distinguished guests, as has been the case at previous state conventions, but for the rank and file of delegates. The chairman stated that the committee has already arranged for the devotion of four cars to officials' use during the entire three days of the convention. One of these has been assigned to the department commander, another to the state auxiliary president, a third to the department adjutant and the fourth to distinguished guests.

In addition to these, the committee plans to solicit the use of a score or more of other cars with which to furnish transportation for Legion and auxiliary delegates, particularly to and from their meeting halls and central field on the occasion of the drum corps contest.

Everyone in Albany has been asked to consider himself an entertainment committee of one, and co-operate with the transportation and other convention committees in that spirit.
