

CASCADIA CAMP DINNER SERVED UPON BIRTHDAY

Lebanon—The accomplishments of the CCC camps of the South Santiam district were cited at the Sunday dinner at the Cascadia CCC camp commemorating the fourth anniversary of its establishment. According to the report, 35 miles of forest protection road have been completed and five important look-out stations have been erected on the Cascadia Ranger district of the Willamette forest adding greatly to the detection of forest fires. The Rabbit Camp guard station and two headquarters buildings at the Cascadia Ranger station were erected by the Tree Troopers.

Adding to the recreational value of the Cascadia district, the Trout Creek Forest camp and the Fernview camp have been constructed and the House Rock camp at Serep creek is nearing completion. A recently completed road into this camp makes it available to the public from the Santiam highway. The House Rock camp will be open to the public for the first time this summer.

PLAY PROGRAM IS EXTENSIVE; CHIEF RESIGNS

Albany—Albany has been given the benefit of a prospective recreation program far exceeding any similar program ever conducted here. Mayor C. R. Ashton said yesterday in announcing that preliminary steps toward launching the enterprise will be taken at the meeting of the 1937 recreation council Tuesday.

Mayor Ashton said that the 1937 recreation plan will be supervised by Frank Ferris, who has been selected by C. A. Howard, state superintendent of education, to supervise recreational programs to be financed by the Work Programs administration in Linn and Benton counties. Ferris will meet with the council here Tuesday.

Ferris is to maintain headquarters in Albany. According to Mayor Ashton recreation activities this year will be conducted by probably 11 instructors each giving six hours a day to the work, in addition to common labor necessary for maintenance of playgrounds and equipment. This, he said, is by far more time than was allowed instructors under the SERA program for 1935. Last year's program was conducted locally without federal supervision.
