"Maybe we would make enough money during the football season to buy a couple of baseballs for the fall." Seriously, he added, that if he had known half of the month of April was to be taken up with weeping skies he would have had his football men in suit for a brisk spring practice.

PAR GOLF WITHOUT MEANING SAYS SARAZEN

COURSES FAIL TO KEEP STEP WITH PLAYERS

Asheville, N. C., April 13 (AP)—Mr. Average Citizen, says Gene Sarazen, the golfing farmer from Connecticut, is being deceived by the balldrop of "par-cracking" scores. "Par isn't par anymore," he said. "Today, we are playing with modern, scientifically made equipment, but over courses that have not kept step with time."

Sarazen, in Asheville for an exhibition match, recalled the scoring of a week ago in the Augusta national tournament, saying that no day was par more than 68, when the card showed it 72. The winning score was 283 by Byron Nelson of Reading, Pa., five under official par, but Gene said it was 11 strokes over the actual standard figures.

He said four years of competition have proved the "Masters" course at Augusta to be a "weak test."

"Most courses of the present day," he said, "are easy for the pro and hard for the club member. They put bunkers 150 or 175 yards away from the tee, where the average golfer will get in trouble. But the pro can carry it with a spoon or brassie."

"Now that clubs are so modernized for a scientific game and the balls travel farther, the courses should be remodeled. Most of them are out-of-date and are badly in need of modern architecture."

NO STYMIE RULING WILL BE WATCHED

Chicago, April 13 (AP)—Gorton B. Fauntleroy, president of the western golf association, termed an "interesting" today the action of the New York golf association in deciding to experiment for one year with a rule that in match play tournaments a ball lying within 12 inches of the cup or opponent's ball may be lifted at the option of either player.

"Our association eliminated the stymie for one year and will hold match play tournaments for another year without it," Fauntleroy said. "The New York experiment is interesting, but we are concerned more with satisfaction of players under our no-stymie rule. Contests universally were for it during the past year and we will keep a record of all stymie situations this season to further check on whether it will be permanently eliminated."

LOTS OF FISH NOT PROBABLE ON FIRST DAY

Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, said prospects for good fishing conditions on opening day, Thursday, April 15, were not "any too bright at this time," and cautioned Oregon fishermen not to expect too much in the way of catches.

Wire indicated, however, that owing to the fact there has been considerable moisture and snow, angling in the state would be exceptionally good in May and June.

Rolled and muddy waters of the Deschutes, McKenzie, Rogue, Columbia and Willamette rivers, Oregon's finest in fishing waters, will handicap fishermen for the next two weeks, or until improved weather conditions allows them to clear and recede.

Sportsmen of the Rogue river area are blaming mining conditions for the gloomy angling outlook.

Streams heading in the Cascades are expected to be virtually non-yielding until heavy snow run-off is carried away and the waters recede.

The central Oregon lake region is yet closed, due to winter snows and only those wishing to hike several miles through deep snow will be able to take substantial catches.

All coastal streams are expected to yield an abundance of ocean-run cutthroat provided that rain ceases at least two or three days prior to Thursday's opening.

The Oregon legislature recently passed four game code laws, none of them of major consequence, or seriously affecting this year's fishing.

Changes passed by the recent legislature are:

1—Trout under six inches. Unlawful to take trout under six inches in waters of Hood River, Wasco, Jefferson, Deschutes, Klamath, Lake, Crook, Wheeler, Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Grant, Harney, Malheur, Baker, Wallowa, Union and Umatilla counties.

2—Catfish, prohibits fishing for catfish by means other than with hook and line in Devil's lake, Colorado lake, Horseshoe lake and Mission slough.

3—Bullfrogs. Prohibits taking of bullfrogs (now a game fish) by means other than hook and line. Angling license required.

4—Fly fishing. Unlawful to fish in waters of Davis lake, located in Deschutes and Klamath counties, and in that portion of the Deschutes river extending from the headwaters at Little Lava lake downstream to the first bridge in any other manner than by artificial fly.

41 KNOCKOUTS SCORED DURING AMATEUR CARD

Boston, April 13 (AP)—Sixty-four youths, the survivors of 236 hopeful entrants, will swing tonight into the quarter-finals of the National Amateur boxing championships.

Physical examinations lopped the original list to 199 but the biggest swath came during 128 bouts that continued, one after another, for 11 hours of punch swapping, ending early today.

Forty-one knockouts were scored, with the east dominating the fighting by sending 27 gloved warriors into the quarter finals. Seven of Detroit's eight man squad were among the 20 midwesterners who survived the opening rounds.

Also remaining in the running were 11 far westerners, three southerners and three Hawaiians. Among these was Bill Britton, Forest Grove, Ore., heavyweight who knocked out Leroy Davis, Santa Fe, N. M., in the first round.

The 32 survivors of tonight's quarter finals will mix in 16 semi-finals tomorrow night and winners then will step back into the ring to fight for titles in the eight classes ranging from flyweight to heavyweight.

All titles are open, last year's winners having come into the professional ranks or retired.

"He isn't out of the woods yet," said Dr. E. B. Castle, "I feel that he will recover, but complications may develop. His condition still is critical."

The 49-year old outfielder, who batted .344 in 21 years of major league competition, fell 16 feet to a stone walk while putting up a flower box at his home and surgeons took 100 stitches in a wound that extended from his left eye to his neck.
