

# WAGNER LAW AMENDMENTS TO BE DELAYED

Washington, April 21 (AP)—Organized labor leaders and industrial spokesmen who attended a collective bargaining conference called by Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins virtually agreed to delay suggestions for immediate amendment of the Wagner labor relations act, it was learned today.

Almost all the 30 conferees at the meeting, the United Press was informed, were willing to "hold off" on recommending changes in the law at this session of congress. No official stand, however, was taken and no recommendations were made.

Miss Perkins called the session as the first of a series of similar meetings to discuss collective bargaining, guaranteed to labor under the validated Wagner act, and methods of averting industrial strikes.

One of the conferees said both factions of organized labor and most of the industrial spokesmen had agreed to oppose immediate attempts to enact compulsory arbitration legislation. Miss Perkins and other government representatives also were said to view that type of legislation unfavorably.

The agreement would not affect an amendment to the act backed by the American Federation of Labor and providing for recognition of the Federation's Craft unions by the National Labor Relations board in collective bargaining.

Miss Perkins said the conferees, despite differences in certain viewpoints, were "unanimous that the Wagner act in the law of the land and we expect to live up to it."

She said that topics reviewed included:

1. Advisability of written and verbal collective-bargaining agreements.
2. Desirability of agreements limiting stoppages of work during the life of a contract by negotiatory machinery.
3. The responsibility of both sides to a contract.

A series of "model contracts" for different industries may be set up at the conclusion of the series of conferences, it was indicated.
