

## FOREST CHIEF ASSUMES DUTY: WORK BOOMING

Lebanon—R. C. Burgess, for many years with the forest service, arrived here last week to assume his duties as district ranger of the Cascadia district of Willamette National forest. Burgess takes the post left vacant by the death of Lawrence Prizell, who died last March after a service of a long period.

Burgess was formerly with the Crescent Ranger district in the Deschutes National forest with headquarters at Bend, Oregon.

Burgess is considered well qualified for the post. Much of his experience in eastern Oregon was gained in grazing, of high value in the Cascadia district since its eastern section provides a range for thousands of head of sheep and cattle. The new ranger has also had long experience in fire fighting and general administration duties.

Boyle E. Anderson, who has been acting district ranger since the death of Prizell, will continue his service in the Cascadia district as assistant to Burgess.

**BUILDING IS PUSHED**

## SAND, GRAVEL PLANT BOOMS

Independence—Improvements at the Independence Sand & Gravel plant are going forward as planned by the new company which took over that institution a few weeks ago. The plant when completed will be one of the largest and most complete on the river.

## SHORT COURSE FOR TEACHERS

Monmouth—A special two-week session will open June 7 at the Oregon normal school for those teachers who wish to attend a short session which offers only such work as will make for professional growth. In addition to this special course, the six weeks course and later a five-weeks course will begin June 7 and end July 16, and the second term will extend from July 19 to August 29.
