JARDINE WEDS ENGLISH COUPLE

Salem, June 5 (AP)—The Rev. R. Anderson Eng, who married the Duke and Duchess of Windsor, officiated at another wedding today—and a private affair became a public scramble.

He married George Gambie, a coach painter, and slum, 27 year old Doris Haylett from Derbyshire. Before he had finished police had to control the crowds.

Hundreds of spectators were unable to get into St. Paul's church for the ceremony. The police even had to clear a lane for the bride when she arrived with her father.

The Rev. Mr. Jardine read from the same prayer book he used at the wedding of the duke and duchess. After the wedding he presented the bride with the piece of wedding cake given him by her grace. The pretty bride was greatly impressed and told the vicar she would preserve the cake "throughout her life."

No welcoming delegations awaited the vicar when he returned this morning from Chateau de Candie and London, but on the desk of his study was a stack of more than 300 telegrams and letters from all parts of England and the continent.

The vicar was told that nearly all the communications were congratulatory.

Tillamook Grange Commends Martin

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RENEW BATTLE FOR COURT BILL

Washington, June 5 (AP)—Administration congressional leaders took active direction of the supreme court enlargement bill from the White House today.

While they undertook to guide the program to a compromise settlement, there was definite and authoritative word that President Roosevelt was not likely to have an opportunity of appointing more than one new justice to the court this summer.

Justice George Sutherland held the United Press that he had no intention of resigning during the summer recess and that he did not believe any of his associates intended to retire.

The administration congressional leaders were believed to be planning to use the judicial measure as a "key" in pushing other legislation—particularly the hours and wages bill—if they fail of a compromise settlement.

In the opinion of opponents of the court program, the transfer of leadership from the White House to administration stalwarts in congress came too late.

Now were the tight-lipped administration leaders indicating optimism. The final word in directing strategy on the bill has not been in their hands in the past, pending a thorough re-survey of the situation, their plans were indefinite.

COURT ENJOINS STEEL PICKETS

An injunction against strike pickets in Warren, Ohio, and a Republic order for evacuation of a Maybrook works in Chicago were top developments today in the walkout of the steel workers, now ten days old.

An Ohio common pleas court order directed the strikers to desist from interfering with free access to the Republic Steel Corporation's plants. Earlier strike leaders had declared they would "no longer permit their lines to be broken" after a box car loaded with food was delivered to the Youngstown Sheet and Tube company plant at Youngstown, O.

Mayor Edward J. Kelly of Chicago gave the Republic company 48 hours to remove the men who have kept its plant in operation since the walkout started. The mayor said housing of the men in the plant violated city building and health codes.

Strike chiefs hailed the mayor's order as a victory for the steel workers' organizing committee.

Non-committal statements from Ohio's governor and Philip Murray, chairman of the steel workers' organizing committee, on their conference at Columbus left in doubt the status of peace negotiations in the seven-state steel strike.

WAR ADMIRAL WINS BELMONT

New York, June 5 (AP)—Samuel D. Riddle's War Admiral, Derby and Preakness winner, won the 69th running of the famous Belmont Stakes today before a record-breaking crowd of 40,000 persons.

H. Maxwell Howard's Sceneshifter, trained by Earl Sande, was second, about two lengths behind the winner, with Pelouse Stable's Vanמוש third.

It was a remarkable performance that War Admiral turned in, becoming the fourth three-year old to sweep the three major races.

War Admiral clipped one-fifth of a second from the time of his illustrious sire's mile and a half track record at this course in covering that distance in 2:28.3-5.

As the field of seven was dispatched to a perfect start at 4:29, Flying Scout went into the lead with Vamoso second and War Admiral third. The lead was held by Vamoso until the half-mile pole, Charles Kuttsinger whipped the Admiral into the lead and he remained in front to the finish.

At various intervals during the grueling 12 furlong test War Admiral dropped back as if to test his opposition but each time quickly drew away when challenged by his apparently inferior foes.

STIFLE FIRE ON POWDER SHIP

Colon, Panama, June 5 (AP)—Smoke pouring from a hold crammed with 690 tons of explosives aboard the U.S. army transport Ludlow was smothered today, shortly after the ship reached port with an uneasy crew of 63 men.

The smoke first was noticed Thursday, coming from No. 5 hatch.

A platoon of firemen, a board of inspectors, canal chemists, and army investigating committee followed the Ludlow today to an isolated explosion anchorage in Limon bay.

When they returned, Col. Sherburne Whipple said the smoke probably came from a chemical bomb and that there was no fire at all.

Cristofolo firemen danced the cancan on the pier to celebrate the news there was no danger.

The Ludlow will come alongside the navy pier at Coco-Solo, unload her cargo of hand grenades and TNT, and proceed to Galena.

She previously was refused transit through the canal and all harbor craft were moved well out of her way.
