

TWO INDUSTRIAL MEETINGS HELD FOR SILVERTON

Silverton—Two meetings of interest to the Silverton people in an industrial way, were held during the week with Portland speakers on both occasions.

A. D. Chilchill, president of the Industrial Employes union, addressed the local at the former 4-L hall with all available space crowded to hear a talk on explaining the workings of the new organization which was effected following the passing of the Wagner act to take the place of the former 4-L's that admitted both employers and employees into the organization. The I. E. U. is for employees only.

Wallace D. Smith, field man, also of Portland, spoke of the new plans. Attending from eight small mill communities were representatives to learn of the I. E. U. set-up.

Seventy-five percent of the Silver Falls mill employees are of the I. E. U. organization and reports are that more will come in. Non-members now working at the mill will not be forced out but the I. E. U. is working for a closed shop and new workers will be effected by this.

The next meeting will be held Friday, June 11, at which time the new constitution and agreement will be ratified.

The other meeting was held Friday night at the K. P. hall with Ray Hamman presiding, and Orlo Larson serving as secretary. The speaker was Leland Tanner, attorney of Portland, representing the Sawmill and Lumbermen's union. Only a small group was present. Aside from expressing regret concerning the organization of the I. E. U.'s and their agreement in quite definite language, no business was transacted. J. E. Hoerner, local attorney, was active in propounding questions during the time given over for open discussions.
