

BACH BUILDING WORK DELAYED; CHIEF ADVANCED

Lebanon—Although the recent rains materially slowed work, the new Bach building at the intersection of Main and Sherman streets will in all probability be completed by August 15, the date originally set for completion, according to George Harden, Lebanon contractor in charge of the work.

The new building will house the Britton Department store, a new establishment for Lebanon, and the Tucker brothers confectionery. The latter had been in business here for many years until fire destroyed the old Bach building.

The past few days of sunny weather have been a real aid in allowing workmen to catch up on lost time, Harden said.

George Britton, manager and owner of the new store, and Mrs. Britton have established their residence here. They were formerly residents of Yakima, Wash.
