

LONG DISTANCE TOLL CIRCUITS ARE INCREASED

Lebanon—A fourth toll circuit between Lebanon and Albany will be in operation for long distance calls by the end of the week, according to an announcement by John Getgen, manager of the Lebanon Telephone company.

Getgen said the new long distance wire will provide a greatly improved service to subscribers in this area who have formerly been delayed frequently in making long distance calls.

The line is being erected by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, and is used by subscribers of the local utility on a commission basis.

At the same time, Getgen announced that work had started erecting new poles to carry the four toll circuits from Brownsville to Halsey. The project, costing better than \$1500, will be completed in about two months, the manager estimated.

When completed, the poles will carry the four toll circuits now strung on two pole lines. Three circuits are carried on Pacific Telephone poles and one on poles of the local concern.

HALL RESIGNS POSITION FOR SCIO SCHOOLS

Scio—Coming as a distinct surprise to other board members and to the public, the resignation of O. A. Hall as a member of the Scio school board was presented and accepted at the initial meeting Tuesday night of the new board, elected June 21.

Hall had been a member of the board for three years, serving as chairman the last year. F. G. Cary, now serving his second year, becomes chairman. The other members are Glen Thurston, elected by an overwhelming majority at the annual meeting last week. Mrs. Fred Biley is the new clerk, succeeding J. F. Wesely, who had officiated in that capacity almost continuously for more than 25 years. Both Thurston and Biley were sworn in at Tuesday's meeting.

No buses will be employed during the next school year, and it was thought only three grade and three high school instructors would be used. A full staff has been arranged for the grades and two for the high school, the third to be added to the latter staff as soon as practicable. It is expected that about 40 students will enroll in the high school, as against three times that number during the last school year.

Application of new and lighter color paint for the interior of the school rooms is under consideration.

Payment of the principal's salary for the ensuing year is to be made in 12 instead of nine installments, as in the past.

HEAVY HAIL STORM STRIKES DISTRICT

Mr. Angel—According to a report by Fred Kohlmeier, farmer in the North Howell section, a heavy hail storm struck that district about noon Wednesday while the rest of the surrounding communities were having light showers.

He claimed that a good many of the hailstones were an inch in diameter. The storm, which lasted nearly a half hour, stripped most of the hops and knocked off the tips and also knocked down the corn. About four inches of hail covered the ground.

Independence—This section was visited today by a heavy electrical storm which put the power and light lines out of commission for a short time. The rain which followed caused all work in the fields to cease. Considerable hay was damaged by the recent wet spell and those farmers who did not get their hay cut in time for the last rain will get it soaked this time. Some were fortunate enough to get their alfalfa off the fields and the new crop is coming along fine. Other clover crops are being harvested this week.

HEALTH SERVICE PROGRAM HALTS, SCHOOLS GROW

Albany—Following a meeting of the board of control in the county courthouse, discontinuance of the Linn county health service was announced today.

The office of Mrs. Nova Young, county health nurse, will be closed through July and August, because of the expiration of funds.

Plans are in order to begin service next September in much the same manner as it was conducted this year. The board of control will seek funds from the Linn county health association and other organizations which have been instrumental in conducting the services in the past.

Mrs. Sallie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the state tuberculosis association, spoke at the meeting—the seventh annual.

Officers were not elected, as is the custom at the meeting, and a special election will be called later in the season.

SCHOOLS INCREASE

Albany—Linn county schools increased by 682 students the past fiscal year, the annual school report compiled in the office of School Superintendent J. M. Bennett showed today.

The percentage of school-age children in school this year took a 12 per cent jump upward, 83 per cent of the children attending this year, while only 71 per cent attended in 1935-36.

The school census lists 6184 of school age with 6828 in attendance. The figures for 1935-36 were 7733 and 6164 respectively.

Elementary schools showed the greatest increase where 440 more children were enrolled this year. High schools increased by 242. Last year there were 4524 elementary students as compared to this year's 4964, and 1622 high school students as compared to this year's 1864 students.

Total increase in the Albany schools was 79; 36 more enrolling in the grade school and 43 in the high school.

The average daily attendance throughout the county was on a par with last year.

Only 337 students in the county were neither tardy nor absent.

MILL CITY WILL CONSIDER OFFER FOR PLANT SALE

Stanton—Stockholders of the Mill City Manufacturing company, organized in Mill City after the closing of the Hamond company properties, are to meet at Mill City next Wednesday to consider a bona fide offer of sale. This was the announcement today by officials of the company to the Stanton Mail.

All stockholders are to be protected in the sale and each will receive funds to offset the stock in the company. When the company was organized two years ago, many of the stockholders were taken in to the organization and given an opportunity to pay for their stock by labor. Others subscribed the necessary funds.

The organization of the Mill City Manufacturing company is credited with a large part of the success of maintaining the town of Mill City following the shutdown of the Hamond properties. The firm has enjoyed considerable success and has paid returns to the stockholders according to the officers.

The meeting Wednesday night is expected to result in approval of the stockholders to the transaction which is reported to mean increased operations for that district. The company at present employs approximately 75 men, and although no indications were given as to the number which will be employed under the new setup, it is anticipated that more than 100 men will be on the payroll.
