

NEW ATHLETIC FIELD IN USE AT SILVERTON

Silverton—The new athletic field, which will probably rank as Silverton's most far-reaching accomplishment in recent years, was formally dedicated, Saturday night, in impressive ceremonies preceding the first games of the semi-pro series.

Lair Gregory, sports editor of the Oregonian, was given the honor of tossing the first ball over the field with Mayor Wilbur H. Moffett at bat striking a real roller.

L. C. Eastman, former mayor of Silverton, and an active member of the field committee, acted as chairman of ceremonies and introduced W. L. McGinnis, chairman of the general committee on completing the field, who was given a real surprise when the unveiling of the boards revealed "McGinnis Field" as the name of the splendid project of the city of Silverton.

Ray Davenport, past commander of the local post of the American Legion, and district No. 2 commander, made the dedicatory talk at the raising of the American flag which will be a gesture at each game played on the field with the Legion presiding.

Music was furnished during the formalities by the Silver Falls boys' band, J. C. Hansen directing.

In response to the address of welcome and expression of appreciation to the donors of the field by Mayor Moffett, Mr. McGinnis named his committee assistants to include Silver Falls mill workers and "lumberjacks" and individuals, L. C. Eastman, Guy W. DeLay, J. H. McCullough, E. Jay McCall as well as the whole town and its artificers who donated labor and material for the field.

The field is the best lighted and most fully equipped acreage for presentation of sports programs in the northwest.

COAST JUBILEE FOR TILLAMOOK SET THIS MONTH

Tillamook—The annual Tillamook Beaches' jubilee to be held here July 3-4-5, will be much more important to the citizen of this county than is the ordinary festival, due to the fact that it comes at a time when the reclaiming of timber from the huge burned area resulting from the fire of 1933 is getting well underway.

A steady stream of trucks bearing logs from the burned-over sections are pouring into Tillamook each day. The timber is of an exceedingly excellent quality and seems little affected by either the fire or the elements. With half a million feet of logs now coming in to this city daily, and with the assurance that the amount will double within 30 days, is causing local business to show a decided increase.

The saving of the billions of feet of logs which, but for the reclamation program would be lost, is a cause of genuine thanksgiving to the residents of this community to whom the conflagration of four years ago was a major economic catastrophe.

The success of the timber-saving plan has resulted in an intense enthusiasm for the annual jubilee. Practically every business man in the county is assisting in arranging the festival, which is expected to overshadow any celebration ever held in this district.

Many new attractions will be presented during the three day show. These include motorcycle, bicycle, automobile and horse and buggy races; a monstrous water sports fiesta, featuring the Sons of Neptune, famous aquatic stars; a bathing beauty contest; a treasure hunt, street dances, a carnival and numerous minor events.

Visitors to the jubilee will be given an opportunity to visit the ravaged timber and view the logging operations which, in itself, should prove a highly interesting attraction.

Money Drawer Bell Frightens Thieves at Scio

Scio—Disappointed thieves who overlooked a nice little "take" in pinball and other devices in the Scio Confectionery, dumped a cash register into Thomas creek near the rear door of the looted house, after a few dollars in coins had been taken from the machine.

In the opinion of investigating officers, who are thought to have uncovered a hot tip Saturday morning, the job was that of amateurs. Experienced thieves would have investigated the slot machines, state police said.

Labiously tugging the register out of the cold water Friday morning, Dean Morris, who conducts a barber shop near the confectionery, noted that the machine had not been seriously damaged by the bath to which it had been subjected by the robbers in their hurry to get away from the scene.

It is believed the thief or thieves were frightened when the cash register bell rang as the machine was opened, and in their rush overlooked other money that might have been secured.

A smaller cash register was left on the floor of the building near the stove, apparently unharmed, though devoid of change when the proprietors opened up for business Saturday morning.

Other thefts have been noted in this locality in recent weeks. It was stated in the course of the investigation Friday, Dean Morris repudiated the loss of a percolator from his barber shop, the thief having entered the place by way of a rear door. Morris was conducting a raffle of the percolator at the time it was taken.

Morris also reported that several of his chickens had been stolen from the residence on North Main street a few nights before the confectionery robbery.

Added to these petty jobs is also one at the Ross Ray farm two miles south of Scio, in which a rifle and other articles of value were stolen. State police have been assisting in the search for the guilty parties and it was believed Saturday they were on a hot track.

MISSING GIRL SAFE AT HOME; MAIL HAS GAIN

Lebanon—Fears for the safety of Etta Paetsch, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Paetsch, were put to rest when state and city officers found her unharmed in the woods south of the George Weirich home in the Crowfoot district.

The girl, who lived in her mother's home between Waterloo and Lebanon, disappeared Thursday night. Tracked near the Weirich home, she could not be found by earlier searching parties. Upon questioning, State Officer Ernest Larrie and Chief of Police Marion Harnett learned she had wandered as far as the Sodaville community, about two miles, and returned with the alleged intention of heading west.

Authorities placed the girl in the care of a great-uncle, Sam Patterson, of Lebanon.

POSTAL FIGURES BOOSTED

Lebanon—Figures compiled at the local post office by Postmaster Merrill Smith for the month of June indicate a material rise both in stamp sales and money order business over the same period a year ago. The sales also show an increase in this quarter's business over that transacted over the corresponding quarter of last year.

Exact amount of the increase in stamp sales for the first six months was \$931 greater than last year or an increase of 12 per cent. Money orders issued during the last quarter are 12 per cent over those of last year and paid out money order business shows an increase of 30 per cent.

ALBANY SEEKS HEALTH CENTER FOR COUNTIES

Albany—Designation as the center of a child guidance district administration lies within easy reach of Albany, it was revealed at a meeting of local child welfare agency representatives with Dr. Wendell H. Hutchens, psychiatrist from the University of Oregon medical school, and Allen East, psychiatric social worker, both of Portland.

Dr. Hutchens explained that the district of which Albany would be a focal point would be composed of Linn, Benton, and Lincoln counties, and that establishment is contingent upon the provision by the Albany school board of a teacher and a room in which the guidance and clinical work can be conducted.

The psychiatrist explained that the purpose of the program is to provide means for prevention of child delinquency and mental subnormalities through clinical examination and expert remedial or preventive instruction.

The matter is scheduled to be brought before the board at its meeting Wednesday night.

POSTAL GAINS NOTED

Albany—As the Albany postoffice stepped into its first class rating July 1, receipts for the month of June totaled almost \$400 more than in June 1936. G. T. Hockemsmith, postmaster, announced.
