PARK LOCATION WILL BE ASKED BY WEST SALEM

West Salem—A delegation from the city planning board is scheduled to meet with the state highway commission in Portland Thursday to discuss possibility of the commission procuring the strip of land from the west end of the bridge, paralleling the highway, to the city limits, and converting same into a state highway park.

According to W. L. LaDue, city constable and member of the planning board, such a consummation of the board's desires would entail purchase of the land in question by the highway commission. The land is privately owned. If the commission decides in favor of the proposal it will be a precedent-breaking decision as heretofore it has not established any state highway parks within a city limit.

The planning board feels that the strip in question is the best water frontage near Salem and admirably suited for development as a park, Mr. LaDue states.

The West Salem planning board is an auxiliary of the city council, being appointed by the mayor, who is chairman. The board is at present composed of Mayor J. E. Friesch, Col. Chas. A. Robertson, secretary; Warren Baker, Ray Stumbo, Bert B. Flack, Leo Spitzharg, Glenn Adams and W. L. LaDue.
