

STOCK PRICES FLUCTUATE IN DULL SESSION

New York, July 13 (AP)—Stocks settled down to quiet irregularity today while grains soared, with wheat up to the limit of fluctuation.

United States steel stock higher in early trading when it reached a new high for the movement at 113 1/2. It later declined to 111 1/2 and other issues eased with it. Before the close steel came back to above 112.

A rise in gasoline prices in the east aided oil shares. The European situation and far eastern troubles apparently were ignored. Traders hoped for a high rate of steel operations but none anticipated a rise to the high of the year set April 26 at 92 1/2 per cent of capacity.

Chemical shares and some special stocks joined oils on the upside. Aviation utilities, farm shares and amusements were mixed. On the downside were copper, railroad issues, motors, tobacco and rubbers.

Demand for packing issues, together with firmness in oils, provided the only interest. Packers were expected to profit from higher prices. Armour and Wilson gained fractionally.

Chrysler touched 163 1/2, but met support. General Motors at its low was off nearly a point.

Late trading was very dull, but American Can jumped more than 2 points just before the final gong.

Dow Jones preliminary closing averages showed: Industrial 178.24 up 0.46; railroad 54.21 up 0.46; utility 27.88 up 0.33.

Transactions approximated 850,000 shares compared with 1,020,000 shares yesterday. Curb transactions approximated 213,000 shares compared with 218,000 shares yesterday.

PORTLAND EASTSIDE MARKET

Portland, July 13 (AP)—Marking the second day of the tomato season, eggs went up another cent on the Tuesday trade, the advance applying to grades making extra large 22-25, dozen on the exchange. The market was reported steady at the new figure. Butter market locally was unchanged and steady. Oranges took a jump wholesale. The advance averaging 30c on virtually all sizes. Supply short. Although retail demand for asparagus was fairly good for the season, supplies somewhat limited wholesale and prices fully firm on weeks' slight advance. Corn slightly cheaper. Trading slow on wholesale farmer's estate market. Prices generally soft.

Good field grown tomatoes exceptions to general weakness, and virtually all receipts cleaned up early. Price generally 81, down slightly from the Monday figure.

Most yearlings sold \$1.55-75, the former figure the general rule, especially on more than one crate.

Strawberries firm around \$2.25 box and supplies were light. Growers generally asked \$2 on raspberries and received it. Blackcaps sold at \$2.25.

Good corn, almost absent, limited amount of new fancy cut moved at mostly 40c dozen. Turnips 45c and radishes 40c.

Asparagus in limited supply \$2.10. Yellow transparent asparagus around 70c for 20-lb. boxes.

Lettuce quality improved from last week, receipts too large for the market. Most crates moved at 70c.

Squash unchanged at 70-75c on the three kinds offered. Peas 10c. Cauliflower unchanged. Green onions lower at 20-25c dozen bunches.

HEAVY CROP OF CHERRIES CLOGS ALL CANNERIES

While definite estimates are not being made as yet on tonnages of green fruit buyer was admittedly fooled on the size of the Royal Anne cherry crop this year and it is stated if it had not been for the rains the crop this year would unquestionably have been the largest in the history of the industry, or at least for many years.

As it is, canneries are reporting that despite the cracking tonnage coming in from orchards contracted for are far in excess of the tonnage the buyers thought they were getting and already some of the barrels in particular are looking for something to do with their cherries which are becoming too ripe for barreling and canners are reporting back they have sufficient cherries on hand, in fact more than sufficient in most cases.

The peak of the season is expected to wind up this week in most everything but Lambert cherries which are now coming in in quantities.

Some of the lowland orchards are not putting on a very heavy production but what is coming in even in the worst cracked orchards is reported to be cleaner and in better condition than the cherries generally were last year. The reason for this is there has been little maggot injury while the cherries that were cracked in the main were the cherries that were already ripening and these have shriveled up and are virtually out of the way leaving the fine late ripening cherries to be picked.

The cherries have been ripening rapidly and have to be handled in a hurry in many cases right now and as a result canneries have been putting on rush business the past few days and worked through Sunday to keep up the situation.
