OLD BUILDING IS IMPROVED

Dallas, Ore.—Changes, now completed on the way to completion, bid fair to make the plant of the Polk county Farmers Cooperative warehouse a more modern one, according to Clarence Curry, manager of the organization.

A bulk molasses storage tank of concrete has just been finished. It has a capacity of approximately 1445 cubic feet and an approximate gallonage capacity of 11,137 gallons. The new tank has been placed at the south end of the old Mason-Ehrman warehouse which will be extended and will give an additional 2000 square feet of storage space. Another change which has already taken place is the installation of a Carter disc machine for cleaning vetch and rye grass.

A sawdust machine, for the extraction of planthan from red clover, has already been ordered. This machine, says Curry, makes possible full compliance with the state law which recently went into effect and which classed planthan as an obnoxious weed.

The present mixer will be replaced with one of double capacity plus a molasses attachment for the mixing of dairy feed, and this will round out the list of improvements and changes contemplated at the present time.
