Practically all members of the Eugene club are familiar to Salem fans. The battery consists of Bill Jones, fire ball chucker, and Chas. Christenson. Mike Mikulak plays first and Bobby Anet holds down the shortstop job. Other members of the club include Foster Burnett, second base; Bob Welton, third base; Cliff Horner, Ed Siegmund and Don Mabey outfielders.

"Hooker" Lee remains the best pitcher in Corvallis and will start against Walt's tonight. He will have as his battery mate Spec Daily. Fong Lee, a brother of the pitcher, plays in the outfield. Other members of the squad include Mush Torson, Bud Wagner, Joe Spunk, George Gray and Parke Eckman.
