Fight is Necessary For Valley Program

Albany — People in this vicinity were urged to fight, not merely wish, for the big dam project which was recently recommended to congress by U. S. army engineers. The urge for cooperation in struggling for the acceptance of the project was made by R. H. Kipp, secretary of the advisory board of the Willamette valley project committee, in an address before members of the Albany Kiwanis club Thursday.

The project calls for two dams to be built in Linn county, one at Detroit and one at Sweet Home, costing \$14,000,000 while other counties in the valley will come in for their share of the program, the speaker stated, and said the entire appropriation being sought is \$56,000,000, but a small portion of the national program.

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
