

Germans Agree To Respect for Belgian Rights

Berlin, Oct. 13 (AP)—Germany in a formal declaration today guaranteed to respect the integrity and inviolability of Belgium's frontiers and territory.

The declaration supplements similar ones made by Great Britain and France six months ago, recognizing Belgium's desire to remain neutral in any European war.

It was made in the form of a joint note issued by Baron Konstantin von Neurath, German foreign minister, and Viscount Jacques Davignon, Belgian minister to Germany. Germany pledges, as did Britain and France, to assist Belgium if she is the object of attack or invasion.

The German portion of the note lists three points:

1. Germany takes cognizance of Belgium's intention "in full sovereignty to pursue a policy of independence" and Belgium's determination to defend her own soil against any attack or invasion, and to prevent her territory from being used as a route of march or a base of operations in an attack by one foreign power against another.

2. Germany emphasizes that Belgium's inviolability and integrity are of common interest to western European powers and affirms her determination never to impair this inviolability and integrity. She affirms an intention to respect Belgium's territory unless Belgium cooperates in military action against Germany in any armed conflict in which Germany may be involved.

3. Germany pledges aid to Belgium if she is the object of attack or invasion.

It was announced fascist Italy had been apprised of the contents of the note—another reminder to other powers of the "Berlin-Rome axis" of cooperation between Fuehrer Adolf Hitler and Premier Benito Mussolini.

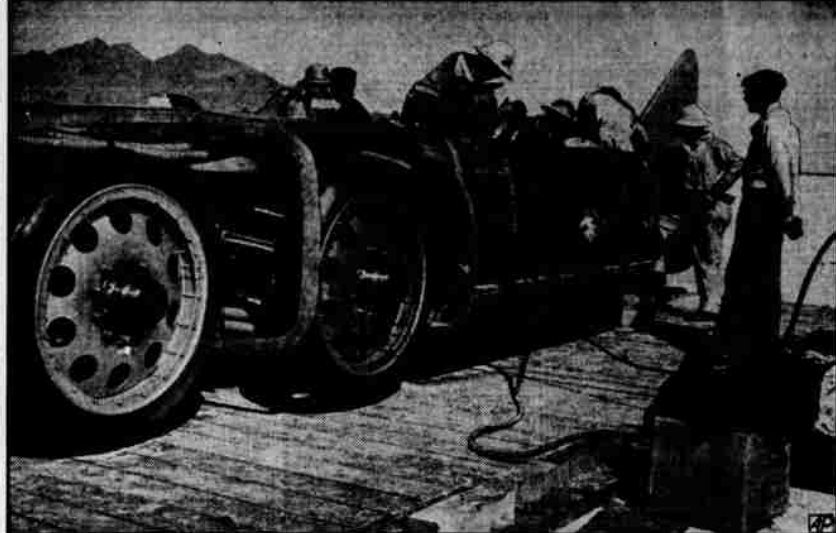

Negro Slaves' Descendants Are on Stage

Portland—The singers in the Hall Johnson negro choir, which is to appear at the Paramount theatre in Portland on Tuesday evening, October 19, are all descendants of old negro slaves and have heard their Spirituals from earliest childhood.

"These songs," says Hal Johnson, "are in their very bones. When I want a certain effect, I first explain the musical side, painting a word picture at the same time and they, having been brought up with negro stories and songs and having lived among revivals and camp meetings, immediately grasp the emotional intention and rise to the mood with a spontaneity which gives me effects that I could not possibly get from singers who did not know and feel the atmosphere in which the Spirituals originated."

Rehearsals often last for hours with increasing concentration and fervor, until the atmosphere of the rehearsal room becomes positively electric and the listener is swept off his feet. Such is the sheer disinterested love of these singers for the emotional expression of their ancestors.

The songs are all traditional; hence each one has numerous versions.

"When we decide to put a song into our repertoire," says Hal Johnson, "all the members sing the version they know. We discuss it thoroughly and decide upon the version best suited to the expression of the song and I then make the harmonic arrangement. After two or three rehearsals, the various parts have been thoroughly memorized and work is begun on the rhythmic, emotional and dynamic effects. I am most careful about the results achieved and work on a song sometimes six or eight months before we consider it ready to be sung for an audience."

Red Cross, Unions To Count Jobless

Washington, Oct. 13 (AP)—The new national unemployment census bureau today enlisted more than 70,000 local units of existing national organizations to aid in the count of jobless scheduled for November 16-17 when census questionnaires are distributed.

The 9000 chapters of the Red Cross are cooperating in the census, as are 25,000 local units of various trade associations, representing industry and mercantile establishments, and 32,000 local labor unions.

A plan is being considered to ask the 48 governors to issue unemployment census proclamations on those days, throwing the weight of state governments behind the drive.

Visitor Expert On Stockings

"Twenty pairs of stockings are a minimum requirement for every woman," according to William Mondshine ("Willys" of Hollywood) who sheathes the handsome legs of many Hollywood stars.

"Such a stocking wardrobe will last a full year," says Miss Nona Crosby, hosiery specialist, in an interview at Miller's mercantile, where she is a guest this week.

"That is, if it includes a variety of types, and is properly cared for. Naturally, women who wear two-thread stockings every day, need a great many more."

"Stockings are getting sheerer all the time, but smart women get better wear out of them by insisting on a whole wardrobe of stockings," she says. "Different weights for different types of shoes. For every day, four-thread stockings wear extremely well. In crepe, twist, especially, they look almost as sheer as the ordinary three-thread, yet are much stronger. For sportswear you had better choose a five or even a seven thread."

"Women are taking better care of their stockings, too. Most women know now that it's necessary to wash stockings after wearing. Traces of perspiration left in the silk are apt to weaken the threads. Stockings should never be rubbed or soaked. Simply dip them in mild neutral suds that are lukewarm or cool, and then rinse them several times in cool water."

"After that, you can roll them in a towel to take out the moisture. Then shape them a bit, and dry away from heat. Never dry stockings on a radiator. This is likely to weaken the threads so that they break into runs easily."

Marion County Tax Reduced

Because of materially increased returns in income, intangible and corporation excise taxes paid to the state, Marion county's share of the state tax will be decreased by \$19,481.41 in next year's budget, according to advices given out by the state tax commission. The general state tax will be reduced from \$52,929.31 to \$30,000 in 1938 or a reduction of over \$22,000 but this will be offset by an increase in the two-mill state tax which will be raised from \$19,552.10 to \$40,000, or a net increase of \$34,447.90, which makes the net tax reduction for the state \$19,481.41.

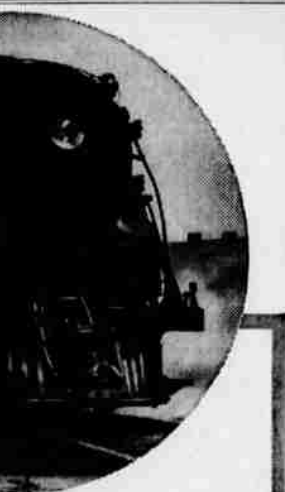
