Crescent City Rail Hearing Before ICC

Portland, Oct. 13 (AP)—Oregon and California groups appeared before Examiner R. R. Molster of the interstate commerce commission today in competition for permission to construct a railroad from Josephine county in Oregon to the Pacific ocean.

Grants Pass, the Crescent City, Calif., harbor district and the California & Oregon coast railroad united forces in seeking a rail route from Grants Pass to Crescent City. The opposition came from the Gold Coast railroad, a corporation already possessing ICC approval for a road from Leland, north of Grants Pass, to Port Orford in Curry county.

"We are ready to proceed with the building of the Gold Coast road," said Gilbert E. Gable of Port Orford.

He assured the examiner his company had "no particular problems" in financing the road. The delay, he said, was the result of uncertainty of federal aid in developing the Port Orford harbor as an outlet.

He asserted that New York capital was available with a bond issue taking care of 60 per cent of the cost and the remainder coming from private sources.

In offering what he called a solution for a right-of-way dispute, Gable suggested building the route down the Rogue river gorge with a spur going south to Crescent City at Gold Beach and one going north to Port Orford.

Neil R. Allen, Fred R. Brown and W. T. Miller are appearing for Grants Pass, Brown, Allen and J. L. Childs represented Crescent City and H. F. Norton of Oakland, Calif., is counsel for the California & Oregon coast road.

Testimony will continue through Thursday.

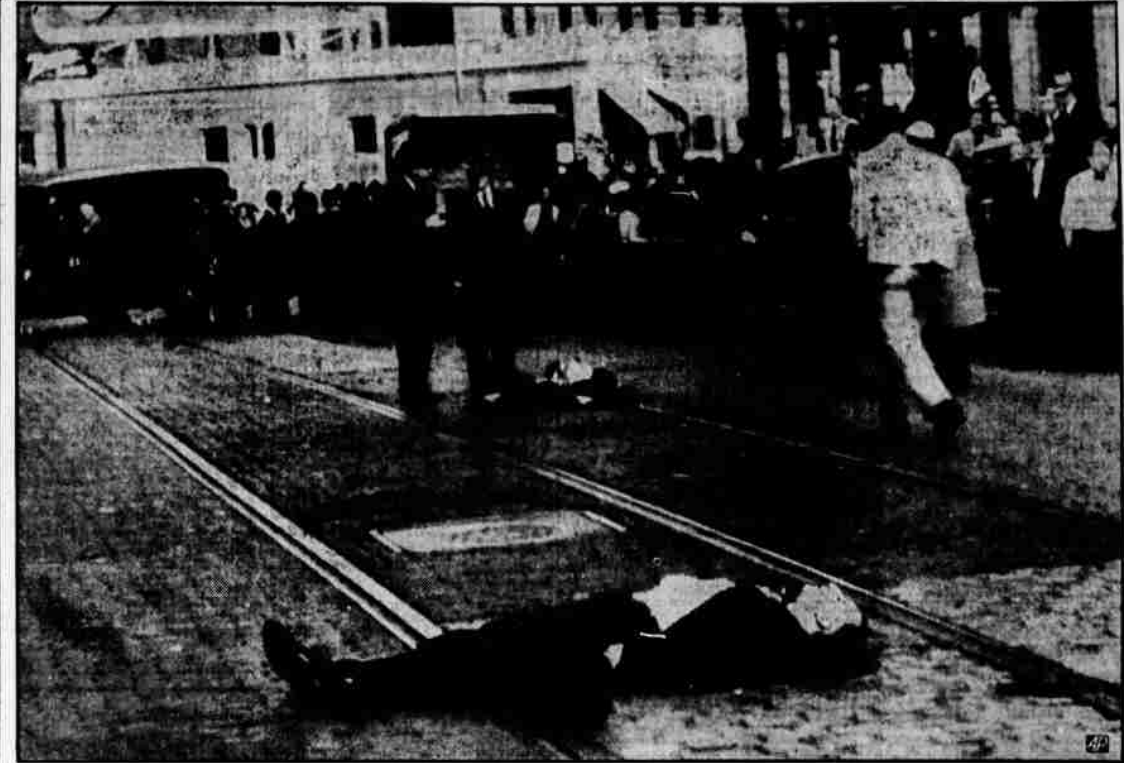
Fowler Leases Waldport Paper

Unions Plan to Call Holiday

Portland, Oct. 13 (AP)—The AFL central labor policy committee today threatened a general "holiday" here Monday if "public authorities are unable to restrain CIO forces and prevent a continuance of the lawlessness."

The federation, involved with the CIO in a jurisdictional warfare over the control of the lumber mill industry in this district, asserted the policy committee was prepared to "recommend to all American Federation of Labor unions in Portland that their members take a holiday next Monday."

AFL spokesmen have announced another attempt will be made to open the plant tomorrow. The CIO countered with a statement it planned to continue "strong picket lines."

Both the mayor and Chief of Police Harry Niles promised the picket concern protection, saying they would rope and block adjacent streets if necessary for "public interest."

Hollywood, Oct. 13 (AP)—Betty Grable, film actress, and Jackie Coogan, former boy film star, today announced definitely they would marry December 18 and issued a joint statement saying they plan a "trial career" for Miss Grable.

"Marriage comes first," their statement said. "Miss Grable's career is on trial. If it mixes with the marriage, all right. If it doesn't, it's too bad for the career."

In announcing their engagement over a year ago, the couple said they would marry when Miss Grable is 21, which will be December 18.

Brady Bandit Confesses to Three Murders

Brady, John Dillinger's "successor," and the gang's youthful "trigger-man," Clarence Lee Shaffer, 21, yesterday in a dramatic five-minute gun battle on a Bangor street.

Foley said the captured gunman also accused Brady of "knocking off" a grocery clerk but said he did not know the victim's name or where the slaying occurred. G-men, however, have charged the gang with the death of Edward Lindsay, a Piqua, O., grocery clerk.

"I guess he's given them (the federal agents) a pretty complete story of the gang's movements since they broke out of jail a year ago," Foley said after the night-long examination in the farmboy gunman's cell.

Foley said Dalhove, whose entry into a Bangor sports goods store sprang the federal trap, appeared shaken by the lengthy questioning and the effects of his wound.

The wounded mobman claimed, Foley said, that the gang did not intend to "do anything" in Maine, but merely wanted to replenish an arsenal depleted when the trio barely escaped G-men at Baltimore.

The gang made three separate trips to Bangor, Foley revealed, from a hideout at Bridgeport, Conn. Foley quoted Dalhove as explaining the gang thought it could obtain ammunition easier in Maine than in nearby states.

When the Brady gangsters fled from an Indiana jail one year ago, they had but \$12 among them, Foley said Dalhove told the federal agents.

For a while, the policeman continued his recital of Dalhove's story, the trio confined itself to "small store jobs." When they had accumulated about \$1,000 they obtained machine guns and went for the jewelry stores and other "big jobs," Foley said.

The policeman revealed the three men had about \$5,000 on their persons yesterday.

Meanwhile, authorities of Indiana, Ohio and Maryland awaited official federal word as to where Dalhove would answer charges, ranging from murder to jewel robbery.

Walter Walsh, 28-year-old G-man, wounded in the mid-morning fusillade, recuperated from a clean flesh wound in the shoulder.

Herold H. Reinecke, chief of the Indianapolis office of the federal bureau of investigation, expressed belief that Dalhove would be returned there to stand trial on two murder charges.

Myron Guernsey, chief G-man on the Brady job here, hinted the case was "far from being cleared up" and "several angles are being followed up," but he declined to disclose what lay ahead.

Authoritative word was lacking, too, on the disposition of the bodies of Brady and Shaffer. A report that Indiana relatives of Shaffer had ordered his body returned there went unconfirmed.
