J. D. Ross, newly appointed power administrator for Bonneville dam, advises Governor Martin that he will pay a

Bonneville dam, advises Governor Martin that he will pay a personal call upon the chief executive within the near future to iron out the difficulties over which they have clashed be-cause "we did not know each other," explaining that he is con-fident of their ability to reconcile their ideas for the utiliza-tion of Bonneville power and work hand in hand. Perhaps Mr. Ross has illusions of converting the govern-or to his idea that the Bonneville and Grand Coulee projects should be immediately interconnected by transmission lines —although Coulee will not be producing power for another seven or eight years—to supply that project with power from Bonneville for pumping purposes at the expense of nearby consumers in Portland, the northern Willamette valley and the Columbia gorge territory. the Columbia gorge territory.

This in face of the declaration contained in the McNary bill that the distribution of Bonneville power shall be "within the economic limits of transmission," and the statements of engineering authorities that the cost of transmitting power 150 miles or more is greater than the cost of generating it.
