Sheriff E. T. Helgeson of Steele county, Minn., Crom's territory, reported Crom had not been seen there for ten days.

Mrs. Crom told officers in Rochester, Minn., that her husband left a week ago on a livestock buying trip, planning to go through North Dakota and south to Mississippi.

**Free Rein for Coughlin Asked**  
Cincinnati, Oct. 21 (AP)—Officers of the Cincinnati social justice union announced yesterday they had obtained 4000 signatures on a petition addressed to Pope Pius XI, by which they seek to overcome what they termed radio censorship imposed upon the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin of Detroit.

Mrs. Beatrice Lammert, moderator, said the council would raise funds to finance dissemination of "the sixteen principles of social justice whether Father Coughlin returns to the microphone or not."

A cablegram addressed, she said, to the Vatican read in part: "Astounded by the fact that Archbishop (Edward) Mooney has seen fit to censor the radio broadcasts and feeling that his (Father Coughlin's) keen intellect has lit the light of christianity to millions of Americans and knowing that the welfare of Americans will be affected if this voice is stifled, we do earnestly petition your holiness to extend your graciousness in returning the Rev. Mr. Coughlin to us on the air."

**Edge Proposes Anti-New Deal Convention**  
Washington, Oct. 21 (AP)—A proposal to summon a free-for-all anti-new deal national political convention late next spring came out of the conservative east today.

Former Senator Walter E. Edge of New Jersey proposed the maneuver in a letter to D. E. Pomeroy, New Jersey Republican National Committeeman. The Edge conference would supplant the off-year Republican National convention sponsored by former President Herbert C. Hoover.

Edge was the Hoover administration ambassador to France from 1929 to 1933. He suggested that the national committee select "50 or perhaps 75 outstanding men and women, representative of every faction of those who oppose the Roosevelt dictatorship."

He said the committee should not be confined to republicans but should be representative of "labor, agriculture, industry, the American Legion and practically all permanent phases of American life, young and old."

That committee would consider the convention suggestion and, if it deemed it wise, prepare for a late spring meeting next year. Edge would center convention consideration upon three "fundamental principles."

"These principles," he said, "should be as non-controversial as possible and could safely include a demand for a revised financial and spending policy; a demand for protection of an independent judiciary, and a demand for the continuation of representative government as provided in the constitution rather than a centralized bureaucracy in Washington."

Edge's suggestion cut directly into the under-cover contest for party influence developing now between Mr. Hoover and former Gov. Alf. M. Landon. They are headed for a show-down when the Republican National committee meets in Chicago November 3-6. The committee will decide then whether to summon the off-year national convention suggested by Mr. Hoover and so far unendorsed by Landon.

Portland, Oct. 21 (AP)—The board of control examined buildings and sites here yesterday and said it wanted an early decision on a state office building for Portland.

Dan J. Fry, secretary, said members of the board—Governor Charles Martin, Secretary of State Earl Snell and Treasurer Rufus Holman—had examined 23 projects.

Rose & Marks, Inc., notified the board its previous offer of the Kamm estate property on South-west Madison street near the city hall included erection of a building.

The legislature made \$700,000 available for the Portland building with the provision rentals from various departments would finance the plan.

### State to Serve In Fehl Case

Portland, Oct. 21 (AP)—Earl Fehl, former Jackson county judge, lost a motion in circuit court yesterday to bar Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle and Assistant Attorney General Ralph E. Moody from representing Governor Charles Martin in a \$548,000 damage action.

Judge James W. Crawford ruled that the governor acted in his official capacity in denying Fehl good time credits on his four-year prison term for the theft of ballots in Jackson county, and was entitled to representation by the attorney general's office.

The judge said it was Van Winkle's duty to aid the governor. Fehl charges the governor with "unconstitutional violations" in his complaint.
