

Defenders of Northern Port Capitulate

northwest Spain had capitulated spread quickly through government forces in other sectors of Asturias province and squads of Asturian miners who had been besieging nearby Oviedo for more than a year marched north to throw themselves at the mercy of the insurgents.

(The miners' army for more than a year had laid siege to Oviedo, held firmly by an insurgent garrison.)

Franco's officers here declared they expected mass surrender of remaining government forces in the north within a few days.

Insurgent control of Gijon left the Valencia government troops holding only a tiny bit of Bay of Biscay coastline from Gijon west to a few miles the other side of Aviles.

(Border reports were confusing regarding the situation in Gijon itself. Officers of six government planes which landed at Biarritz yesterday said Basques and Asturians fought in the streets before the city's surrender. Belarmino Tomas, anarchist governor of Gijon, was reported to have fled to France.)

A score of Spanish government trawlers tied up at Saint Jean De Luz and Balonne, French ports, put out to sea shortly before noon with the intention of trying to rescue as many government supporters as possible from Gijon.

But as most of these vessels lacked radio equipment, Spaniards here feared they would fall into the hands of the insurgents before they learned Gijon has surrendered.

Insurgent officers announced liaison had been established between General Franco's troops in Gijon and the beleaguered garrison at Oviedo. This announcement was interpreted as meaning government troops which had been besieging Oviedo since the start of the civil war 15 months ago had abandoned their efforts to capture it upon learning that Gijon had fallen.

Although the mass entry of insurgents into Gijon was not expected until tomorrow morning, officers said it was possible for the advance guard to penetrate the city tonight.

Father Leo J. Robinson, S. J., president of Gonzaga university, conferred the honorary doctor of philosophy degree upon the school's most noted alumnus before an audience of students, alumni and friends who jammed into the campus auditorium.

The university president conferred the honor "because of his eminence" and the pleasures he has "brought to millions of people."

Crosby responded with a brief expression of gratitude.

Conferring on the honor was the morning highlight of Crosby's return as the glorified "home town boy who made good." He came "home" this morning for the first time since he started out nearly a dozen years ago to hunt a job in a band.

Burr Opposes Extra Session

Opposition to a proposed special legislative session to obtain larger old age pensions was expressed today by Eugene Burr, president of the General Welfare Federation of Oregon, Inc., with headquarters in Portland.

In a letter to Governor Martin, Burr said his federation succeeds the Townsend Old Age Pension organization.

Townsend interests last week asked the governor to call a special session to increase the old age pension allotments from an average of \$21 a month to a minimum of \$30.

The governor had no comment on today's letter opposing the session.

"We are standing for the fundamental principles of the original Townsend plan," Burr wrote.

"We believe it is our duty and privilege to cooperate to the fullest degree with the existing administration, and since the name of Dr. Townsend has been eliminated from the bill that is now before congress, we also eliminate his name from our organization."

Burr said the federation is affiliated with a national organization in Washington, D. C., whose purpose is to obtain passage by congress of the Townsend bill.
