The McMinnville Grizzlies, cherishing a 6 to 6 tie with the Eugene Axmen as the result of a bitterly fought gridiron battle early in the season, come to Salem tonight in an effort to even up a few odd scores with the Salem Vikings. While Coach Bailey has lost Don Mabe from the Grizzly squad, he still retains such men as Sitton and Kreider in the backfield, and Versteeg has been smoothing up the Bailey teaches an aggressive type of football, including an off tackle thrust which opponents have found difficulty in combating.

The Bearcats went right on throwing passes yesterday in two long drills, heralding a 90-minute aerial attack in store for Whittier college when the California Poets invade Sweetland stadium Friday night.

"We'll start throwing passes at the opening whistle and keep right on tossing them until we're in front, I hope," Mentor Spec Keene said today.

Since Coach Wallace Newman's invaders use aerials wherever possible, fans will be in for a wide-open passing game, with both clubs shooting for touchdowns in the plural rather than concentrating on defense.

Yesterday's long practice session plainly showed the effect of hard work on the Bearcat passing attack. Keene paraded eight of his backs in the passing spot, and everyone was hitting the receivers with far better than usual accuracy.

The octet includes Starters Dick Weisberger and Billy Beard, Lettermen Neil Shaffer, Bunny Bennett and Ernie Mosler, and newcomers Irv Miller, John Kelly and Justin Weakley.

Keeping pace with the throwers, Keene's receivers showed their best form of the season yesterday. The return of Art Baird and Walt Weaver gives additional strength at the ends, and George Abbott, Jim McBride, Johnny Kolb, Jerry Laurens and Jim Haek are showing steady improvement in snagging the pigskin out of the air.

On the other side of the line, the Bearcats have no easy task cut out for them in stopping the powerful slants of Bob Shuler, sensational Whittier sophomore fullback, who passes from the left side with plenty of accuracy, and holding down the Poets' speed ace, 140-pound "Flea" Kuniyama.

## Kolberg Will Lead Beaver Club Saturday

Oregon State College, Corvallis, Oct. 21—Big Elmer Kolberg, two year letterman who is generally considered the best defensive fullback on the Pacific coast, has been chosen to captain the Oregon State football team against the University of Oregon at Eugene, Saturday afternoon.

Lon Stiner, Oregon State coach, also announced the Oregon State starting lineup as follows: Don Coons, left end; Frank Nihil, left tackle; Frank Ramsey, left guard; Jim Orr, center; Prescott Hutchins, right guard; John Waite, right tackle; Joe Wandlick, right end; Bill Duncan, quarterback; Joe Gray, left half; Jay Mercer, right half, and Captain Kolberg, fullback.

Only change in the Orange starting lineup is at right tackle where Waite takes the place of Leon Sterling who was injured last Saturday. Only other man who may not see action due to injury is Warren Gillis, second-string left tackle.

## Math Professor Uses Equations to Win 44

Baltimore, Oct. 31 (AP)—A mathematics professor turned coach, who works out "plays like equations," has brought Morgan college for negroes through six years of football—44 games—without a defeat.

"It's all a matter of timing," Coach Edward P. Hurt said. "In science you won't be satisfied with anything less than exactness. You need the same exactness in coaching a football team."

He doesn't talk about his plays, but he was ready with his pencil to draw diagrams of them. He hasn't any favorites—he says he likes anything which will gain ground.

Like the "round robin" he used against Bluefield state teachers in 1935. The full back threw a forward pass, a halfback scooped it in and lateralized it to another half. The second man lateralized again to the fullback, who had come wide around end. Then the fullback made a touchdown. Things like that, Hurt said, account for six-year totals like: Morgan, 983 points; all opponents, 82.

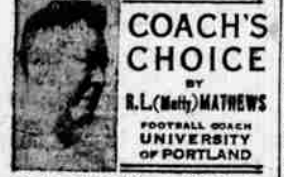
Hurt likes an open game, emphasizing speed and teamwork.

"Colored boys are springy in their running," he said. "They're good broken field runners because of their natural speed."

He played end for Howard university in Washington before he came to Morgan as mathematics professor.

"But I found I was working out plays with poker chips and on the margins of books I was reading," he said. "Now I'm a full-time coach."

"You see," he added, "football is just applied mathematics."

Ernie Swartz, 128 pounder of Vancouver, scored a third round knockout over Jack Curley, Portland, and Jimmy Chapman, 126, Edmonton, won a four round decision over "Bomber" Bailey, Portland.

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## Layden Says Time For Irish to Fight

South Bend, Ind., Oct. 21 (AP)—Notre Dame's fighting Irish have not yet begun to fight. Illinois tied them. Carnegie Tech pulled an upset that surprised even themselves. Now Navy, strong but not great, reigns as a favorite to whip the Irish Saturday for the fourth time in five years.

"Navy has a fighting tradition, too," Irish Coach Elmer Layden said. "But they do something about it on the field. It's time Notre Dame began to fight."

Layden was aroused not only by the tie and defeat, unexpected as they were, but by a miserable showing of the varsity against the frosh.

Unless Layden makes a last-minute switch to improve blocking and charging in the line, his starting eleven against Navy will be approximately the same one that Irish partisans expected to win a national championship.

The answer to "what's wrong with Notre Dame?" probably is that murderous schedule which includes Navy, Minnesota, Pittsburgh, Army, Northwestern and Southern Calif.

Well, he has earned it, judging by reports which have drifted down this way from the Western International league where Frisco wore the protectors during the past season. It is extremely difficult to break into the charmed circle of professional baseball officials and oft-times politics enters into the matter, especially where men of equal ability are being considered. Edwards knows his baseball and the fact that he created such a favorable impression in one of the youngest leagues in the country is all in his favor.

Amby Schindler drew the spotlight in the recent Webfoot-Trojan melee at Los Angeles, but those who saw the game say the young fellow had considerable assistance from his mates. One thing which particularly impressed one eye witness was the thorough manner the Trojans went about that little task of knocking every man wearing a green shirt off his feet. No matter where the play was in progress, if a green shirted warrior was still on his feet 50 feet away a Trojan went after him. There was no looking around to see what had become of the ball carrier. Coach Jones uses somewhat different tactics on forward pass—particularly on the defensive side. Most coaches instruct their ends to bore in and get rid of the passer just as quickly as possible. In the Los Angeles game one or two opponents would stay with the Oregon passer, obstructing his view as much as possible, but making no dives for him. If he ran back they kept after him and only when they saw they had a chance to spill him for a good loss did they close in.

Apparently this talk about a complete sell-out for the Oregon-Oregon State game at Eugene Saturday is not a publicity stunt. Tickets are changing hands at \$5 a throw while much to his regret, the graduate manager's office is returning cash to late applicants. No need for anybody in these parts to be disappointed, since football, just as classy as that at Eugene, will be seen on two successive nights at Sweetland field. Thursday night Salem and McMinnville engage in a scoring bee and then on Friday evening Willamette will endeavor to uphold its record of not losing a homecoming game in a decade. Whittier college will do its best to send the homecoming alumni home in a cloud of gloom.
