Youth Gored By Angry Bull

According to reports received here, young Harvey entered the stall in which the bull was tied, preparatory to leading him out to pasture. As the boy was attempting to loosen the manger rope the bull lunged at him.

Harvey suffered a severe gash in his stomach and was tossed over the animal's head into the manger. Reports indicate that the fact he was thrown into the manger probably saved his life, as the bull would have gored him to death if he had fallen in the stall.

Harvey's cries brought aid. It was necessary to summon Dr. VanWinkle from Jefferson, who immediately ordered the boy into the Salem hospital.
