Like the women who purchase their spring millinery in the winter, the Whitman college missionaries are crowding the sports calendar at a similar rate. Football remains much alive and kicking yet up around Walla Walla to a point where full fledged games are being played. Whitman took on Mitchell's Wimpies, A.A.U. champs of that district and had little difficulty in winning, 69 to 37. The new rule, eliminating the center jump, except at the start of the game and at half time, was operative in the Whitman contest. Larger scores will result with the center jump in the discard. Likewise it's going to be a bit tougher on the players since that brief period of relaxation which occurred when the two centers faced off in the middle ring, will be missing. Whitman has intact the club which came down here last February and gave Willamette its hardest tussle of the season.

Unless Oregon State officials have a change of heart, it is extremely likely Willamette and the Orangemen will not meet on the basketball court this season. Usually the two clubs play three or four games early in the season, but word from Corvallis is to the effect that "our schedule is complete." Negotiations with the University of Oregon for a home and home series are under way and it is likely these games will be played late in December and early in January. Oregon undoubtedly will have a team of championship calibre, one which will be well worth seeing in action.

Jack McCarthy appears to be a bear for punishment. We admire his grit in continuing his efforts to build up the tight game and will string along with him, but nevertheless, believe we will both take a beating. Jack has announced a fight card at the armory for the night of November 24, Thanksgiving eve, and will have as a part of the main event our old friend Frank Rigli, the strong man from the Brooks onion district. Just who will break Rigli in his efforts to hit the comeback trail has not been determined. McCarthy is working through a Tacoma promoter and may locate a prime heavyweight along the sound.

Billiard Experts In Three Way Tie

Philadelphia, Nov. 13 (AP)—A three way tie for first place loomed today in the world's pocket billiard championship. Willie Mosconi, of Philadelphia, who lost last night to Edwin Rudolph, of Cleveland, 125 to 121 in 40 innings, after leading by 117 to 80 as late as the 47th inning. Mosconi meets Irving Crane, the 32 year old Livonia, N. Y., youth who has bounded to the top of the heap with six straight victories. If Mosconi beats Crane, either Ralph Greenleaf, of New York, the defending champion, and Rudolph will join them in a triple deadlock for first.

Pacific Squad Stubborn But Yields, 6 to 0

A record of not having been beaten by a conference rival since College of Puget Sound got the breaks in Tacoma October 13, 1933, was kept intact by Willamette last night as the Bearcats scored a single touchdown win over Pacific. Dick Weisgerber's attempt at conversion failed so the final score stood 6 to 0. And while Pacific failed to get anything like a consistent attack, yet those 6 points appeared mighty like a wet pumpkin seed. At one stage of the game the ball, which gradually became so dark it was hard to follow from the stands, slithered through Bill Beard's hands after Gilman had punted for Pacific. A Badger recovered on Willamette's 30, but an intercepted pass immediately nipped a potential touchdown drive on the part of the visitors.

Willamette got its sole touchdown early in the first period when Beard, on a reverse, glanced over Pacific's left end from the 3-yard line. The drive started on Willamette's 20 after an exchange of punts. During the trek down the rain spattered field Willamette, using a reverse effectively, picked up five first downs. Weisgerber, driving hard, made 12 yards on a single effort while Beard slashed through for 16 on another. A pass, Beard to Gallon, just over left end, which was good for 5 yards, and a lateral, Weakley to Weisgerber for 6, were included in the march down toward the east goal.

A heavy Pacific line, which on many occasions outcharged the Bearcats forwards, stopped Willamette on two occasions when it appeared Coach Kenner's squad might cross the final white stripe. One came in the second period after Schmidt, who by the way played a fine, heads up ball game, snared Gilman's pass on Willamette's 28. Beard quickly kicked to the Pacific 16, out of bounds on the W. U. 47. Beard lofted a pass to Walt Weaver which was good to the Pacific 28. Beard and Weisgerber collected 6 yards in three plunges through the mire. With four yards to go Beard flipped a short pass to Weisgerber. Dick slipped as he cut in and Pacific took the ball.

Abbott recovered when Pacific fumbled after Beard had punted early in the second half to start Willamette rolling again. Weisgerber immediately clicked off 10 yards and repeated for an even dozen, placing the ball on the Pacific 11. Pacific, backed up to its own goal, dug in deeply, broke up two cracks at the line and batted down two passes to effectively halt the thrust. The Badgers did a bit of threatening on their own account in the fourth period when Ed Eliertson faked a punt and then passed down the slot to Taylor to the Willamette 46. Johnson, on a reverse, went down the sidelines to the Bearcat 32. At this juncture Blake boomed through to take Eliertson's next aerial thrust as he lobbed the ball into the air after being rushed.

Willamette collected 12 first downs to three for Pacific and amassed a net of 212 yards from scrimmage and passes as against 71 for the Badgers.

Army Game Draws Ire Of 'Honest Taxpayer'

New York, Nov. 13 (AP)—Little do the young men of West Point and Notre Dame, as they smack each other around at Yankee stadium today, realize what a storm they have aroused in the breast of many an honest taxpayer.

The man who does know about it, though, is Captain F. A. March, 3rd, public relations officer at the point. "Thousands of honest taxpayers, it seems, are convinced they have a constitutional right to watch the army eleven play both Notre Dame and the Navy. March, at the moment, is the deep-dyed villain who's holding out on the common people. He handles half the tickets.

Every duet to today's game was disposed of weeks ago, and detectives hunting by West Point have been employing the trail of every ticket speculator in the city. When they find a ticket that has been sold originally to a member of the Army Athletic association, that member is dropped forever.

"We have only 40,000 tickets to begin with," Captain March explained. "Notre Dame disposes of the other 40,000. Then, when we have taken care of some 30,000 applications from members of the army association, there are only 10,000 left for the general public.

"Naturally, the public gets mad. There are a stack of letters on my desk every day, each one pointing out that the applicant is a taxpayer and is going to see the army play or take it to his congressman."

Practically all the members of the Army Athletic association are officers or ex-officers. They and their families flock to New York and Philadelphia annually for West Point's two big games.

"They are the ones who supported army's athletics from long years back, when there were no big gate receipts, and we can't go back on them now," March said.

Lebanon Keeps Record Clear
Lebanon—The Lebanon high school Berrypickers still boasted today a record untarnished by defeats for their overwhelming victory over St. Mary's of Beaverton on a sopping wet field the evening of Armistice day. The score was 19-0.

Lebanon made a net gain of 190 yards for 12 first downs, while their opponents showed a net loss of seven yards and made two first downs.

The Berrypickers play Cottage Grove next Friday night for the final conference game of the season under the Lebanon floodlights. A victory means the conference title for Coach Reed Clark's charges.

Panthers Not Family Style Says Priestly

Portland, Ore., Nov. 13 (UP)—The Panthers of Pittsburgh will not be invited to the Rose Bowl this season. Even if they go through their rigorous schedule undefeated—a feat which would stamp them as national champions—they haven't a chance to be in Pasadena on New Year's day.

I first heard that Pittsburgh was not on the list of eligibles when I passed through the mid-west. The closer I moved to the coast the more I heard that the Panthers would not be considered. I heard it in Colorado, Utah, Montana, Idaho, Washington and finally—east of all—here in this neighboring state of Oregon, whose university team today plays California, the eleven almost certain to be the coast representative in the January 1 extravaganza.

With the Californians here, Rose Bowl talk predominates the conversation of Portland football enthusiasts, because it is known by everyone that if the Golden Bears get by Oregon today and Stanford next Saturday, the Pacific coast title and the Rose Bowl bid is theirs.

And California will have the right to name its opponent. In an effort to pin down the reports concerning Pittsburgh, which I know to be true, I sought out the man who is best qualified to know the situation. Ken Priestly, graduate manager of athletics at California, and I asked him point blank how his school felt.

"That is something I can hardly answer," Priestly said. "After all, we haven't been asked ourselves. But I will tell you this, though it may not have any bearing on the matter. If California gets the Bowl bid, we will try to get as an opponent the team of a school which we feel has the same scholastic standards and the same athletic ideals as California."

Priestly would not say whether or not California considered Pittsburgh as a "like." As for myself I am not up well enough on university ratings to offer an opinion.

But from all I can gather from unofficial sources, Pittsburgh is not being considered because of one or two reasons.

Either its football is considered too high pressure, so to speak, or its team is considered too almost sure looking at its hands. There are many observers in these parts who will tell you that the chief objection to Pittsburgh is the fact that the trouncing it handed Washington last year still is green in the memory of all the coaches out here, and none of them cares to commit gridiron hari-kari by being caught on the same field with the Messrs. Patrick, Daddio, Goldberg, Stebbins, and company.

All I'm sure of is that the Pitts won't be out here.

AAU Expected To Re-Elect J. T. Mahoney

Boston, Nov. 13 (AP)—Defeated by a vast fusion majority in his recent campaign to become mayor of New York, Jeremiah T. Mahoney may be re-elected president of the National Amateur Athletic union without campaigning at all by another fusion majority that practically amounts to popular acclaim.

The head of amateur sport's ruling organization already has announced he is not a candidate for a second term. But the delegates to the A.A.U.'s forty-ninth annual convention, which opened a busy three-day program today, are paying that announcement little heed.

Mahoney is head of the executive and foreign relations committee, one of 31 scheduled to meet today and the one to which principal interest was directed.

This committee will recommend the stand to be taken on the national collegiate athletic association's campaign for control of American Olympic committees on track and field, swimming, rowing and wrestling.

That control now rests with the A.A.U. The question before the house is whether to retain it, relinquish it or seek a compromise arrangement that will satisfy both parties.
