

Civic Program Lebanon Gets Mayor Support

Lebanon—Mayor Joel C. Booth outlined a nine-point program of civic improvement for the new year before the councilmen and several visitors attending a meeting of the city council in the city hall Tuesday night.

The introduction of his address was devoted to expressions of gratitude to the councilmen and other city officers for their cooperation in assisting in the program which he had outlined to them at the beginning of his term in 1936. The 1936 program, he said, is practically all completed or under way.

The new program, in brief, follows:

1. Complete the purchase of a property for the city park, as already provided for in the current city budget.
2. Follow up the road program with special emphasis on repairing all city streets and treating them with the chemical preparation made available by the Crown Chemical Co. of Portland.
3. Maintain careful watch on city finances.
4. Continue efforts to close the portion of Second street between the high school campus and Newport field for the protection of school children, a movement which is slowly finding favor with property owners involved and which can be accomplished if certain conditions are observed.
5. Cooperate with the school board which faces a problem of overcrowding conditions in the public schools. The mayor appointed Councilmen Gill, Zimbrick and Darr as a special committee to study the problem with the school board and report its findings to the council.
6. Promote the proposal to build a large addition to the city hall, thereby providing greater facilities for storage of fire fighting equipment, for the library, the recorder's office and jail.
7. Make a study of the city's drainage problems which will not arise in the heaviest rains. Councilmen Gill and Zimbrick were appointed to study the problem with the city engineer.
8. Cooperate in every way possible with the Lebanon Garden club which is beautifying the cemetery.

The mayor also pointed out that the bonded indebtedness had been retired from \$28,000 to \$14,000 during the year, and attempts to reduce it further had met with failure because the funds were not available, but because bond holders refused to accept the principle until they were mature. He suggested establishing a sinking fund for all or a part of the remaining bonds.

"Dad" Witman Honored

Witman was celebrated with a surprise party in which councilmen, other city officers and visitors participated at the end of the council session Tuesday evening. Witman, better known as "Dad," was presented with a birthday cake by Wes Munyan, which with coffee provided by Mrs. Harley Howe and Mrs. F. A. Williams made refreshments in which all heartily joined. Munyan and Mayor Booth highly praised "Dad" for his service of more than 20 years as city recorder, giving him chief credit for retiring the major portion of the city indebtedness and for other services. The recorder, in turn, warmly thanked those present for the expressions of congratulations and other kindnesses.

Library Popularity Gains At Silverton

Silverton—Circulation at the Silverton library in December of this year was exactly 27 more than that of a year ago. In December, 1936, circulation totaled 1406, while this past December it was 1437. New readers added during the past month numbered 28, which was 12 more than registered the same month a year ago. Thirty-five books were added to the library shelves during December and 15 were returned to the shelves from library and repair.

The library force is now busy taking inventory and making the annual report which should be completed by January 15.

Linn School Census Shows Decided Gain

Albany—Linn county's school census reveals an increase of 6.5 per cent this year and nearly 12 per cent in two years, according to final figures for the 1937 canvass as revealed by County School Superintendent J. M. Bennett.

The census shows a total of 8713 persons aged between 4 and 20 years in Linn county this year, including 4434 boys and 4279 girls. This is an increase of 529 over the total of last year, when 8184 such persons were enumerated, including 4148 boys and 4036 girls.

Increases were shown by the Albany, Lebanon, Harrisburg, Sweet Home, Foster, Mill City, Scio and Sodaville districts, while losses were reported from Brownsville, Halsey and Shedd.

The Mill City total and gain are for Linn county only. This, however, is a joint district. The part of Mill city within Marion county shows a decline of 8 from 101 in 1936 to 93 this year, bringing the gain of the entire district down to 1.

Addition of children of school age by the 1937 census will mean an increase of approximately 63000 in the county common school levy next year, Mr. Bennett said, inasmuch as this levy is based upon a tax of \$10 for each school census child in the county.
