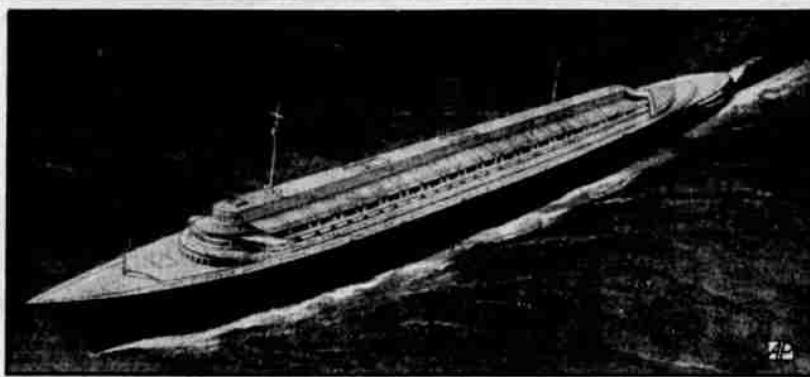
The advisory board includes: F. F. Foster, Albert Frank, Frank Lesley, John Steinbrenner, John Van Handel and Charles Gehlen.

County Relief Figures Below State Average

Albany—Linn county relief recipients in November fell far below the state average per 1000 population, it was revealed by Alvin Lova, executive secretary of the Linn county relief committee, from statistics received from the state relief committee.

The state average was 25 recipients to every 1000 persons in November, the report stated, while the Linn county average was but 18.

Furthermore a sharp rise of 49.9 per cent over the previous month was reported for the state, while the November increase in Linn county was but 14.5 per cent.

Funds spent for direct relief increased 23 per cent throughout the state and but 12 per cent in Linn county.

Last month's local record showed 172 new applications for relief on file with 76 carried over from November, totaling 248 on hand. Sixty-five were closed, leaving a net total of 413 active cases on record.

The total relief cost for December here in cash was \$3498.55, exclusive of old age assistance, blind aid and aid to dependent children.

Old age assistance applications filed in December for action by the relief committee this month totaled 108.

Poverty Chief Plea

Albany—City police activities have resulted in the rounding up of 12 automobile drivers who had failed to secure their 1938 license tags yesterday. The delinquents were being hauled into city court before Judge Karl Horton.

The majority of ticket-holders explained that they had no money with which to pay fines or buy plates. None could, however, the judge stated, explain how they could buy gasoline.

Linn Crime Increases

Albany—Fines and bail forfeitures paid into the justice court at Albany totaled \$1997.80 during 1937, according to figures compiled by the justice of the peace. Those fines were paid by a total of 177 defendants, who paid in an average of \$11.29 each, with fines ranging from \$1 to \$150. Of the total the state received \$536 and the county \$1461.80. The total of criminal cases handled in this court last year was 433, an increase of 67 over the 1936 total and 132 over the total for 1935.

Bas Barn Burns

Albany—Fire late Wednesday destroyed a barn on the John Bass farm near the Pacific highway four miles south of Albany, and all of its contents including a truck. The estimated loss is \$1500.

It was believed the flames originated in the cab of the truck. Bass tried to take the truck from the barn but the flames thwarted his attempt. It was reported that the loss was partially covered by insurance.

Electric Razor Users Protested By Radio Fans

Stacyton—Stacyton may be the home of the "bearded beauties." Members of the city council, in regular monthly meeting Tuesday night, investigated the possibilities of legislating against the use of electrical equipment which interfered with the operation of radio in this territory.

"I have been swamped with complaints from residents of Stacyton protesting against the use of equipment which interfered with radio reception here," Councilman G. W. DeJardin told the aldermen. "I would like to know what the situation is and what can be done about it."

Stacyton Water Problem Gets Council Vote

Stacyton—Members of the city council Tuesday night voted to expend approximately \$2000 for the purchase of water mains which are to be installed in the city water system immediately.

At the same time the council discovered it had expended more than \$500 for tile to be used in the reconstruction of the Third street bridge, and now was unable to use the material.

The jumble over the purchase of the tile for the bridge arose when officials of the Oregon Pulp and Paper company, of Salem, holders of a right of way for the ditch which flows through the town, refused permission for the installation of the tile in the construction of the bridge.

The original plans called for the laying of the tile, five wide, across the 60-foot of street, through which the water of the ditch would flow, and which would act as a guarantee against the tearing away of the banks. The paper company officials originally approved the project but last night reported the installation of the tile would serve to stop sticks and rubbish and might make the company liable to property holders for water damage.

The bridge, which spans the ditch on Third street has been condemned for loads in excess of five tons. The council members named a committee to investigate possibilities of reselling the tile so that the city would not lose on the transaction.

The purchase of the water mains came after several weeks of discussion as to the extent of the project. It was decided Tuesday night to extend the 10-inch main from the Beauchamp Drug store corner to the high school, with the present 16-inch main in that sector, being added as an extension to give property owners of that district greater water pressure.

Jacob Spaniol, local merchant, was given the order for the main.

Pastors Protesting Pinball Practice

Aurora—Pastors, members and friends of all churches represented in Canby attended a meeting of the city council Monday evening and entered protest against the passage of an ordinance intended to license pinball games. The bill was passed on first reading some time ago and when it came up for final reading at the December meeting it was met by a petition signed by nearly 200 church workers who offered sincere protest.

The bill was laid on the table. A petition representing the other faction and containing a greater number of signatures than the first petition, was presented at the Monday meeting and passage of the ordinance urged.

An ordinance authorizing payment of \$150 for the construction of cement sidewalks at the city building was passed.

Fire Chief Chris Kraft, Jr., recommended that the city purchase 250 additional feet of fire hose for use of the fire department.
