Mason, Rowland's companion, is still in Albany awaiting developments. It was intimated by the deceased's brother in Pittsburgh that the body would be shipped east for burial.

Dog Licenses Slow

Albany—Dog license fees are slow coming into the office of the county clerk, it was announced. The Linn county court has readopted last year's rates of \$1 each for males and \$2 each for females and spayed females. According to County Clerk R. M. Russell only 13 licenses have thus far been issued since January 1. Last year's dog license fees totaled \$2561, paid upon a total of 2106 dogs, it was announced by the clerk. Proceeds are used to indemnify owners of sheep which are killed by dogs.

Postal Figures Hit High Mark

Stayton—Business transacted at the Stayton postoffice last year touched a new high mark in the history of the department, Postmaster Grace Neibert reports.

The sharp increase in the business last year is indicated by the marked increase in the number of C.O.D. packages handled here. According to the reports 1,124 collect packages were consigned to local residents. This number is many times the number usually handled by third class offices, Postmaster Neibert said.

The office issued money orders to the extent of \$34,186.53 last year, a gain of \$2,798.92 over the report for 1936. An increase of approximately \$200 in stamp sales, bringing the total for the year to \$7,167.32, was reported.

The Christmas business this year was the largest ever reported by the local office. Although the mail generally was confined to postcards and small packages, more than 9000 one and one-half cent stamps were sold.
