"If they do I'll bite them!" exclaimed Rip.

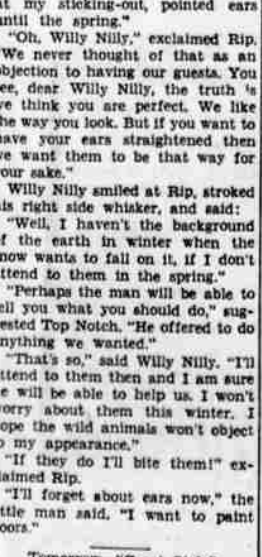
"I'll forget about ears now," the little man said. "I want to paint doors."
