

Russia Opens First of Red Parliaments

Moscow, Jan. 13 (AP)—Soviet Russia's new red parliament opened its first session yesterday with Joseph Stalin and other government leaders watching from seats of honor in the rebuilt throne room of the Kremlin.

The parliament, or supreme Soviet, began its career when one of its two houses, the Soviet of the union, met this afternoon.

The parliament's 1143 men and women of undisputed loyalty to Stalin were elected last December 12 in the first elections under the Soviet union's new constitution. They brought instructions from many parts of Russia's vast area to tell Stalin that "all his counsel and all his advice we deem to be law."

An elderly white-bearded academician named Bach was led to the rostrum by an army officer to deliver the first speech after a 10-minute ovation for Stalin died down. Stalin, with a muffled spotlight trained on him, occupied a box at the head of members of the parliament of the communist party and government officials.

Their boxes flanked the platform. Foreign diplomats watched the ceremony from boxes along the right wall.

Secretary Krushchov of the Moscow party committee turned over the rostrum to Bach, who nominated A. A. Andreyev, a member of the politbureau, as president of the Soviet of the union. Andreyev was elected by acclamation.

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Glass May Join In Filibuster

Washington, Jan. 13 (AP)—Senator Carter Glass, (D. Va.), who celebrated his 80th birthday last week, was expected to participate in the senate filibuster against the anti-lynching bill.

Glass, whom President Roosevelt has described as "the unreconstructed rebel," probably will reiterate the contention of other opponents of the controversial measure—that its passage threatens the unity of the democratic party.

Senator Tom Connally, (D. Tex.), leader of the filibuster, was especially optimistic about the possible effect of a plea by Glass. Connally already has predicted that the opposition eventually will defeat the plan of the bill's sponsors, Senators Robert F. Wagner, (D. N. Y.), and Frederick Van Nuys, (D. Ind.), to bring it to a vote.

Glass, however, has been in failing health and may have to cut short his efforts to keep the filibuster going.

Meanwhile, the newest member of the senate, Senator Lister Hill, (D. Ala.), announced his intention of supporting the filibuster with a speech at some later date. He said that the south could eliminate lynching during the next five years if federal intervention was not imposed.

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Scio Council Bond Burned

Scio—At the recent meeting of the city council the body had a \$500 fire by consigning to the old-fashioned heating stove bond number 2, together with coupons connected therewith.

City Treasurer E. D. Myers stated in his annual report that the bond had been paid at maturity last September. The report showed the finances of the city in good condition, with available money in each fund account.

The sum of approximately \$1400 had been collected during the last year by Water Superintendent J. F. Oupor, according to his official report. A commission of 5 per cent is allowed Oupor by the city.

Renewal of the \$1000 insurance policy on the city hall at a premium of \$35 for three years was ordered by the council.

Radio Conversation Provides Thrills

Monmouth—Conversing by radio over a distance of 1700 miles with their son and his family was a novel thrill experienced by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Cady and Mrs. Cady's sister, Mrs. S. Huot.

The son, Dr. Harold R. Cady, dentist at Kimball, South Dakota, who owns an amateur radio set, requested his parents to drive to Portland Sunday, where the contact was made from an amateur station in a private home at 11 a.m., Pacific time.

The reception was exceptionally clear and for an hour the conversation was carried on with all members of the two families participating. The four-year-old grand-

daughter talked with her grandparents and recited a poem for them.

The grandson, only two years, added his bit to the conversation by telling of his Christmas gifts. The son expressed a desire to hear his father laugh and Mr. Cady, always of a jovial nature, acquiesced with a hearty response.

Mr. and Mrs. Cady have expressed a desire to locate an amateur station closer than Portland that they may contact their son at frequent intervals.

Cady is one of Monmouth's merchants, occupying the large store building at the corner of Main and Knox, formerly used by the Miller Mercantile company when that concern flourished in Monmouth. Mr. and Mrs. Cady came west from Eagle Butte, S. D., several years ago, settling first at Dallas.

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Fuselage and Piece of Skull Wash Ashore

San Diego, Calif., Jan. 13 (AP)—A wrecked airplane fuselage and a portion of a human skull were found yesterday on the seashore 41 miles north of here, near Oceanside, by two young motorcyclists.

Edward Starr, 21, Oceanside, driving his motorcycle with a companion whose name was not learned by authorities, reported to Cliff Sparks, a deputy sheriff at the beach community, that he and his friend found the fuselage, apparently washed ashore. Searching for additional wreckage, the youth said, they found the piece of skull, about half a mile away.

Condition of the skull indicated it had been in the water or sand for a year or more. Authorities believed the skull came from the wreckage and said its condition eliminated possibility that the plane might have been the navy's patrol bomber which was lost at sea two weeks ago with seven men aboard. Sheriffs, coroners and navy officers began an investigation to determine which of several planes lost in the Pacific off southern California in the past few years yielded the gruesome find.

Portland Woman Found in Hiding

Chattanooga, Tenn., Jan. 13 (AP)—A 25-year old mother who left notes indicating she was going to drown herself and her 3-months old baby, was found hiding with the child at the home of a friend Tuesday.

The woman, Mrs. F. A. Thomas, who came here from Portland, Ore., told police that she left the notes and hid because she was afraid the baby would be taken from her by the family of her husband, who has been missing since Christmas.

Officers Re-elected By Teamsters
