

Magic Not Way Out Declares Glenn Frank

New York, Jan. 13 (AP)—Dr. Glenn Frank, head of the program committee of the republican party, told the New York board of trade yesterday, "We must divert ourselves of faith in magic as a way out of the difficulties of our generation."

Asserting that obstacles had been placed in the path of the competition of free enterprise, he said:

"The sooner we learn there are no rabbits in the hat, that artificial devices are a delusion and that the national future must be built on the normal enterprise of its people, it will be better for us and our children."

"There is no flaw in the political policy or economic practice of our national life that steady and responsible intelligence cannot correct."

"America is not dying. The ranks of business men, industrialists and financiers are not devoid of intelligence, competence, and social sensibilities."

"The political genius of the nation is neither bankrupt nor under monopoly."

"There is a vast fund of leadership in the nation that suffers neither from the rigor mortis of reaction nor from the St. Vitus dance of irresponsible Utopianism."

"It is for us as a people to find and to follow that sort of leadership and to help it life the standards around which the stable intelligence, effective competence and social sense of Americans who believe in democracy and in intelligently modernized economy of private enterprise can rally."

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Clergyman Seeks to Prove Soul Power

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 13 (AP)—The Press Scimitar said today the Very Rev. Israel Harding Noe, dean of St. Mary's Episcopal cathedral, is in the midst of an amazing fast undertaking "to prove that the soul is above the need of material life."

The paper said friends of the clergyman reported Dean Noe went on an exclusive orange juice diet December 23, 1936, and since January 2 of this year has eaten only a tiny communion wafer and drunk a sip of wine at the church's regular communion services, held three times a week.

The story said this diet "probably" had not been supplemented even by water.

It continued: "Dean Noe is not an exhibitionist, is not trying to make an impression, wants no publicity and does not care what people think. While he has made no secret of his fast, he has not made any public statement about it."

"He is trying to prove that the soul is above the need of material life. He believes he can give up all material life and yet not die. If we get the theory correctly from his friends, he believes that he can live a wholly spiritual life in an earthly environment."

"The dean is a student of material science, but he has a set of theories of the universe all his own. All life, he says, is electro-chemical. All energy comes from the cosmos. Man has always taken energy in the form of food derived from plants or other animals. These, however, derived their life-giving substance from the universal cosmic rays."

"The process of life is simply a conversion of electro-chemical energy. Dean Noe believes he can, or is trying to see if he can, reach a state in which he takes his life energy directly from the original source. If he can attain such a state, he will be free of all earthly needs, entirely independent of the normal processes of life by which the human body eventually deteriorates into death."

Van Devanter to Conduct Trial

New York, Jan. 13 (AP)—Willis Van Devanter, 79-year-old retired justice of the U. S. supreme court, will preside over the trial of William J. Graham and James C. McKay of Reno, it was announced yesterday.

The trial of the two on mail fraud and conspiracy charges will begin next week, probably Wednesday.

Van Devanter has been assigned temporarily to the federal district court here because of the crowded condition of the court's calendar. The former supreme court justice presided last week at the trial of two men on charges of dealing in stolen securities. He surprised counsel for both sides by cutting through much of the customary courtroom red tape and giving unusually pointed instructions to the jury.

Graham, McKay and about 20 others are accused in connection with an alleged swindle in the sale of securities.

Grants Pass, Jan. 13 (AP)—The Grants Pass Aerie of Eagles, state convention hosts in 1938, yesterday paid the "last penny" of their \$1,750 convention deficit, officials said, caused by misappropriation of funds.

The Aerie was organized as the largest in the state the year before the convention was held.

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Italian Trade Plan Suspended

Washington, Jan. 13 (AP)—Negotiations for a trade treaty between Italy and the United States have been suspended. It was learned yesterday, because of Italian insistence that Secretary Hull admit King Victor Emmanuel's right to the title of emperor of Ethiopia.

Hull refused to use the latter designation in the trade document. Informed persons said Premier Mussolini turned down a suggestion that a paragraph be inserted to make it plain that the pact was not to be construed as any form of American recognition of Italy's Ethiopian empire.

State department trade officials said they were seeking some means of ending the stalemate.

Actual negotiations, however, were expected to lapse at least for several months, during which the situation might be adjusted. As long as the deadlock continues, trade relations will be governed by an extension of a previous Italo-American treaty.
